Connie Mack big had many a bitter disappointment, but none so bitter as what 1928 seems to have in store for him. To fall at the very edge of splendid triumph will cause him more grief than he knew when his Philadelphia Athletics were chronic tail-enders.

And fall it seems the 1928 Athletics must. Connie built this year with the utmost diligence, carefully studying veteran experience with fiery youth so that the qualities of both were used with the best advantage. That product of his genius battered its way to the top of the league only to slip back after a tenure of only one day.

Since that late series with their dead rivals, the New York Yankees, when the Athletics lost three out of four and their hold on first place, Connie's charges have been presented with a number of opportunities to overhauled the leaders, only to fail at the most critical moments.

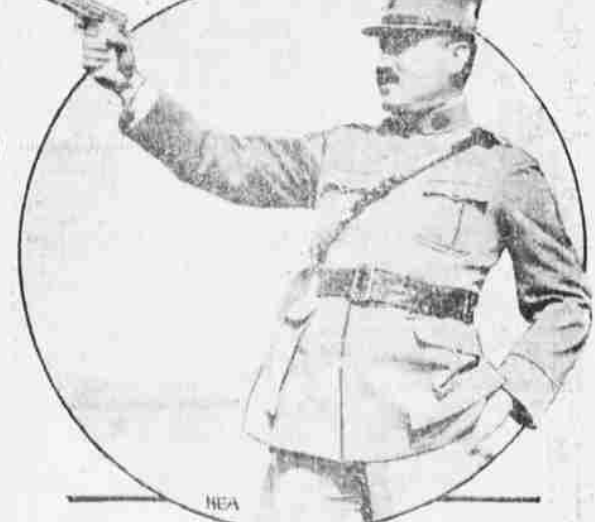
