Have you seen these books?
"Timbuctoo," Leland Hall. The author, a young New Englander, went to Timbuctoo to satisfy his own desire for the experience. He spent some months in this most fabulous city on the southern edge of the Sahara desert, living in one of the native mud-walled houses, making friends with the Arabs and blacks and seeing life from the inside. A vivid work.

"Herbert Hoover," Will Irwin. A decidedly readable biography. Mr. Irwin and Mr. Hoover were fellow students at Leland Stanford and the book is in the nature of a tribute to one whom the writer has evidently worshipped from the days when he was "Our Most Eminent Senior."

"Safari," Martin J. Johnson. Mr. and Mrs. Martin Johnson went to Africa to take the motion pictures of wild animal life. Their adventures in getting the pictures are told by Mr. Johnson. The sixty odd pictures add much to the pleasure of reading this book.

"Outlawry of war," Charles Morris. One library patron has pronounced this book to be "the best book in the library." The author, editor of the Christian Century, offers a constructive policy for world peace. One critic writes, "I regard this volume as one of the most significant published in recent years because of the importance of its central idea and the brilliance with which it is presented."

"The American Orchestra," by Theodore Thomas. Winner of the Pulitzer prize for the best American biography. Theodore Thomas introduced the symphony orchestra to America. His story is of vital significance to American musicians and music lovers. For besides telling the musical history of the nation it is a record of struggles and triumphs characteristic of the musical life of today.

MENUS

By Sister Mary

BREAKFAST—Cassia melon, cereal, vegetable hash, granular muffins with dates, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON—Baked Mexican corn, cabbage and carrot salad, brown bread and butter, chocolate drop cookies, milk, tea.
DINNER—Baked minced lamb, scalloped potatoes and onions, corn salad, baked peas with chocolate sauce, milk, coffee.
Many children around five years of age appear their range of hunger by quickly drinking the prescribed glass of milk and then rushing and playing with the necessary solid food. One way to overcome this habit is to wait until the vegetables and bread and butter have been disposed of before serving the child his milk. Then the half of a cookie with the milk makes it "go down" happily.

Baked Mexican Corn

Two cups chopped tomatoes, 1 cup corn cut from cob, 1 cup corn meal, 1/2 cup sliced ripe olives, 1 cup chopped onion, 1 tablespoon minced onion, 2 tablespoons minced parsley, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon paprika, 1 tablespoon melted butter, 2 eggs, 1/2 teaspoon white pepper.
Mix tomatoes, corn, meat, olives, and cornmeal. Beat eggs well and add to first mixture with onion, parsley, salt, pepper, paprika and melted butter. Mix thoroughly and turn into a buttered baking dish. Cover and bake one hour in a hot oven. Remove cover for last 10 minutes to brown top if necessary.
The olives can of course be omitted and canned tomatoes and corn be substituted for fresh.

Bridge Pointers

Two weeks ago we started a series of fifty bridge questions, which will cover a round flow of bidding and play. Each day a hand is given, and the questions concerning that hand submitted; answers, which should be filed up by the reader before going further, and then the answers will follow.

DEAL 6:

♠	8-5-2	♠	8-5-2
♥	7-6-4	♥	7-6-4
♦	A-K-Q	♦	A-K-Q
♣	8-5-2	♣	8-5-2

WEST NORTH
EAST SOUTH

South is the Declarer with a No Trump contract. The first trick is: West leads the Queen of Clubs, dummy plays the Queen of Clubs, East, the King, South, the Ace.

QUESTION No. 14: What should closed hand lead and dummy play on trick 2?

QUESTION No. 15: If dummy win trick 2, what should be lead, and what should South play to trick 3?

ANSWER BLANK

ANSWERS

14. South should lead the Jack of Diamonds and North should play the Queen of Diamonds. This play is made in order to give North the four entries which he needs to can get them in, as is probable, the adverse Diamonds are divided 3-2.

15. North leads the Queen of Spades and, unless East plays the King or Jack, South plays the Ten. The Ten of Spades in this case is the double-dummy which should be taken unless there is a total of nine (or more) cards of the suit in the two hands.
