BORAH ANSWERS GOVERNOR SMITH

Refuses to Touch on Religious Matters — Not Political Issue, He Says

TULSA, Okla., Sept. 25—(AP)—Senator William B. Borah of Idaho answered Governor Alfred H. Smith on the three major issues of the presidential campaign, farm relief, prohibition and immigration, in a campaign speech last night. He made no reference to the so-called "religious controversy," which he declared earlier in the day, "is not a political issue and I refuse to discuss it."

Introduced to the thousands as "the outstanding American statesman of our times," Senator Borah was received with prolonged applause and cheers.

His opening words, after greeting Oklahoma, were in explanation of his "deep interest" in the present presidential campaign.

"This afternoon I received a letter at my hotel, a friendly letter, I suppose, saying: 'You've always been considered rather irregular as a Republican herebefore—why are you regular in this campaign?'"

"I am interested, deeply interested, for two reasons," the senator explained. "The first reason for my interest is known as the farm problem—and the best equipped man in the United States today to deal with that complex problem is Herbert Hoover. My second reason is my desire to see the constitution of this country maintained and enforced as the people have written it. Those reasons are why I'm regular now."

This senator said he believed Governor Smith's stand on immigration meant that he would reject the present laws which might permit an influx of European laborers of low standards to compete with American workmen.

"Hoover's stand on immigration cannot be misunderstood but Smith never has been definite in the matter, in my opinion," he said.

Attacks Mellon

Governor Smith also trained his guns on the secretary of the Treasury, whom he charged with "concealing knowledge from the senate committee that it received \$250,000 in Liberty bonds from the Continental Trading company, oil transaction to repudiate campaign efforts to help cover a deficit hanging over from that party's 1920 presidential campaign."

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 25—(AP)—Indications contained in a scrap of paper that the remains of suspected boy victims of 21-year-old Gordon Stewart Northwest may have been used as part of a formula for chicken feed today had sent authorities on a new investigation of the Winesville chicken ranch.

If the investigation reveals the evidence to be genuine, authorities believe they will have accomplished a major task in solving the mystery of the alleged slayings. The paper which officers found in a search of the ranch disclosed a chicken feed mixture and ended with a note specifying the use of the bodies.

A mass of other evidence that has been gathered by officers since Northwest's nephew, 15-year-old Sanford Clark, first told his story of the slaying of boys on the isolated ranch, was left in laboratories here for analysis.

Governor Smith opened his address last night with a reference to a dispatch quoting Mr. Hoover as telling a group of young students from Maryland that the new generation "must begin now to take over the responsibility of the party and to carry it on."
