Queen of Ur 27 When Killed To Join Her King

CLEVELAND, O., Sept. 25 (AP)—The queen of ancient Ur, whose body was dug up recently in the Chaldees, was only 27 years old when she was slain so that she could be buried with her husband, according to Dr. T. Wengert, Todd, of Western Reserve university, an authority on the age of skeletons. The king himself, Dr. Todd said, was only 45, when he died. The bodies of the king, the queen and one of the nobles of the court were recovered in excavations at Chaldees. "The skulls of the queen and the noble of the court had been crushed," said Dr. Todd. 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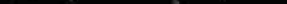
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
