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Champion Socked To Canvas But Retains Crown

The champion's left arm went limp and he passed out freely with his right until the round ended.

Second Loss to Goodrich
It was the second time in his career that Mandell has lost to Goodrich. The first meeting was part of the light-weight elimination contest conducted by Tex Rickard in 1915 to choose a successor to Ben Leonard, retired light-weight champion. It ended in the sixth round when the Buffalo boxer was awarded the victory on a foul.

Subsequently, Goodrich went on to win the tournament and a claim to the title. He was later defeated by Rocky Kansas, who in turn lost to Mandell.

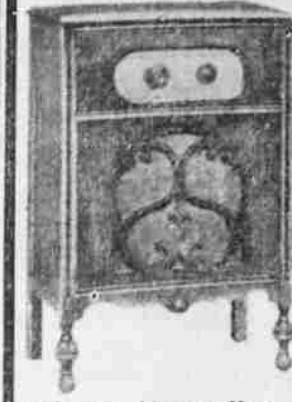
