Continuing the series of fifty Bridge questions, two of which were submitted yesterday in relation to Deal G, Deal H with one question relating to it follows:

Deal H

South is the declarer playing a No Trump contract.

QUESTION No. 14. What cards should be played to the first trick?

West should lead: _____
Dummy should play: _____
East should play: _____
South should play: _____

Answer

To trick 1, West should lead the Four of Clubs. Dummy should play the Ten of Clubs, East should play the Ten of Clubs, and South should play the Five of Clubs. South makes the unusual play of ducking and losing a trick, although he holds the Ace, King and Queen of the suit led; he does this because he knows that East has no more clubs. Having eight in his two hands and knowing that West could not have made a sound lead from a suit of less than four cards, South knows that East's Ten must have been a singleton. The declarer must lose one Club trick, as there is no chance for either hand to discard a losing Club; and losing that Club on the first trick forces East to lead up to one of Dummy's three tenaces. East's lead must enable the Declarer to make at least two tricks in the suit led and must give him information which will be of value in the subsequent development of the hand.

If South won the first trick, he would have to lead Spades, Hearts or Diamonds and take the 50-50

THE GARDEN

NARCISSI FOR THE WINTER MONTHS

Growing narcissi in bowls for the decoration of the living room or for the dining room table is of ever increasing popularity. The Chinese Lily, as called, and the paper white narcissi are the popular types. They are as easy to grow in a bowl of pebbles and water or better still in prepared fiber as they are in earth. The one advantage of growing in soil is that the bulb may be ripened off for another year while they are worthless after blooming in water or fiber unless grown for two years in earth. They are so cheap that it isn't worth the trouble to keep them.

Paper white narcissi are grown by the million each year and are almost the surest bloomers we have. They are at least certain to show buds. If properly nurtured bulbs are planted. The buds may blast, however, unless a little care is taken not to keep them in too hot and dry atmosphere. If the buds blast it is a signal to the home owner that the atmosphere is too dry and hot for beautiful living, and means should at once be taken to provide moisture.

Those bulbs like a cool atmosphere so they should be placed in windows as far removed from radiators and registers as possible. They also are best grown when they do not get the sun all day. Half a day of sun is plenty. Grown in windows where they get no sun at all they are apt to grow too long and spindly and will need support as the leaves will be weak.

The trumpet narcissi or daffodils are even more imposing home ornaments than the paper whites.

MENUS

BREAKFAST - Grapes, cereal, cream, butter, with bacon, potatoes hashed in milk, half and half muffins, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON - Pressed corned beef, toasted jelly sandwiches, coleslaw.

DINNER - Veal stew, corn on the cob, sliced tomatoes, pumpkin pie.

The following rule for pumpkin pie insures a crisp, uncooked undercrust. The pie is not the traditional "early American" New England variety but is very good.

Pumpkin Pie

One cup sifted pumpkin, 5 cup sugar, 2 eggs, 2 cups rich milk, 1 tablespoon flour, 1 teaspoon ginger, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons melted butter, 2 tablespoons powdered sugar.

Beat white of one egg for meringue. Beat remaining whole egg and yolk until very light. Beat in sugar, flour and spices sifted together. Gradually add milk, beating constantly. Beat in melted butter and stir in pumpkin. Cook over a low fire, stirring constantly, until thick and smooth. Turn into a baked and cooled pie shell. Beat white of egg until stiff and dry. Beat on a platter and use a wire whisk. Beat in powdered sugar and spread roughly over pumpkin mixture. Bake eight minutes in a moderate oven to cook and color the meringue. Serve cold.

and Chinese lilies which are of the polyanthus type of narcissus. They are quite as easily grown but soil should be used for them. They should be potted up as soon as the bulbs can be secured, using no fertilizer except possibly a little bone meal in the soil, with the nose of the bulb just above the soil. Moisture and not water in a dark place, keeping the soil damp but not wet. They will spend several weeks in filling the pot with roots before they start leaf growth. When the blunt nosed leaves start pushing up it is time to bring them to the light. They will then spin along and unfold their golden trumpets and make fine ornaments. Empress, Empress King Alfred and Golden Star are favorite trumpet varieties for growing in pots in the house and they can be grown

with a minimum of trouble by anyone even in city apartments. They should be given the coolest quarters in the home as they do not like a hot, dry atmosphere any more than do the polyanthus types.

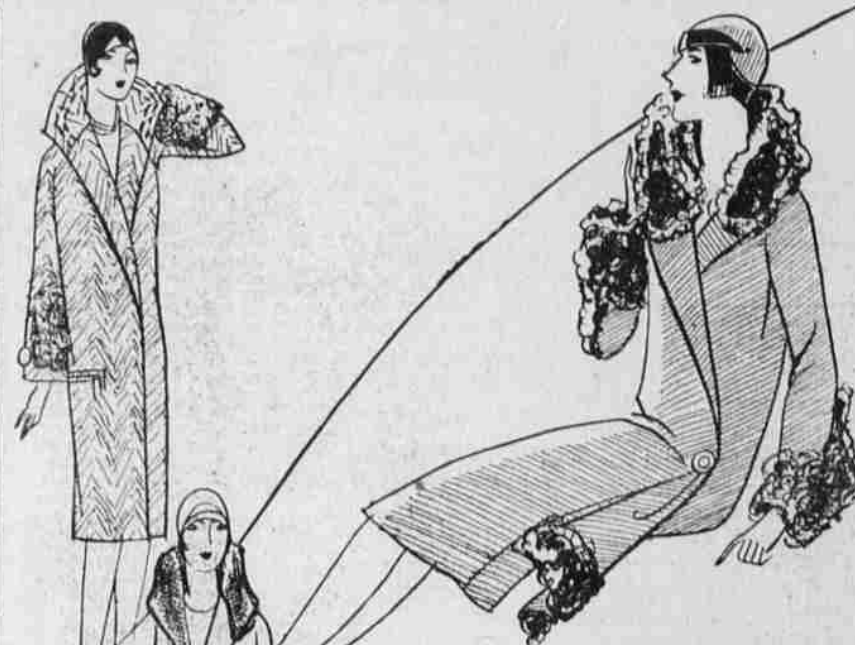
Former Kaiser Will Celebrate
