TEAMS TEAR INTO
LAST MAD SPRINT

Yankees in Detroit for
Final Games — Giants,
Cards in Close Race

The mad drama portrayed by baseball in the season of 1928 sweeps into its final scene, where the great climax must be reached by midnight on Monday. It is deemed that on that date the curtain must drop on the current season, but it may be that this latest spectacle provided by the master dramatist of the game will yet eclipse anything that has gone on before.

The Yankees have dragged themselves into Detroit with some trepidation regarding the final five games of the season, for all of the fact that these victories will put them where they cannot be caught, even if the embattled Marliners succeed in taking four straight from the White Sox. Many things have happened to the Yankees in the last three months (for their month) and they don't believe this sixth season until they can feel it.

Master Showman Husky On the other side of the stage, the master showman of all players for the final string scenes designed to give his actors the final center. John Joseph McGraw has one hundred million fans praying for his success, but he gets there just the same. He has made himself wealthy on the good-natured (or not) hate of baseball followers outside of New York, and yet he enjoys giving them yet other things in which to hate him more.

The Giants, now only half a game behind the Cardinals as a result of Dixie Vance's brilliant victory in Brooklyn yesterday, are face to face with the Cubs for four engagements, beginning with a double-header this afternoon, and a pennant hangs upon every pitch. The Cubs remained theoretically in the running yesterday by taking a morning shot at the Phillies by 5 to 3 while the Cardinals were losing, and they plan to fight the Cardinals hard enough at least to keep John McGraw's boys out of the thing even though they realize it no longer is possible for Chicago to effort to be rewarded with a championship. The Cubs could do—if several things combined in their favor—but the odds are about a million to one against.

While the Braves are making threatening motions toward John McGraw's cherished ambition, the Cardinals will be in Boston, where they hope to tighten upon three games against the defenseless Braves. It would seem from this distance that the Red birds should sail into the Polo grounds on Sunday for the final clash with a margin of one game over the fighting cockroaches of McGraw, but the devoted Braves have been known before to turn upon their tormentors when least expected.

Any margin greater than one game, of course, would convert Sunday's finale into something just a little less than a common, ordinary ball game. The goal of the Cardinals, therefore, is three straight wins on the banks of the Charles and a message that the Cubs can win two in New York. It is hard to see how the Braves can expect so much against this inspired team McGraw has set upon the baseball community.

Vance Day's Star
Dixie held the cards to five harmless hits, fanned seven to hit the 200-mark even for the season, and waddled impudently away with his twenty-second victory. All of this happened after Dixie, with cold, raised the hopes of the Cardinals in the very first inning by passing four and forcing home a run.

The Robins got two back for Vance in the home first, and he was very well satisfied, but Glink Hendrick had to avenge it as usual. He found three Robins on base in the seventh, and was thoughtful enough to pound a home run to left field within the lot, making the final debacle read 8 to 1.
