The Westway club will meet at the home of Mrs. Herman Goeck Friday evening at 7:30 o'clock.

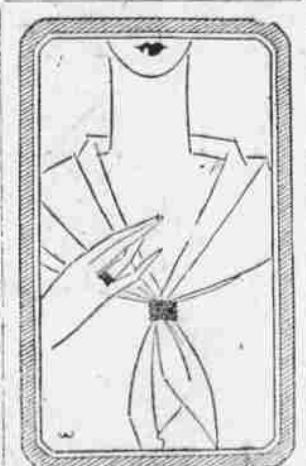
## MENUS

BREAKFAST—Grapes, cooked cereal, cream, creamed dried beef on toast, milk, coffee.  
LUNCHEON—Noodle soup, toasted combination sandwiches, hearts of celery, six cookies, milk, tea.  
DINNER—Roast pork, baked sweet potatoes, cinnamon apple rings, cauliflower in cream sauce, head lettuce with French dressing, cantaloupe sherbet, fruit wafers, milk, coffee.

School children must have a hearty and nourishing breakfast with plenty of time to eat it. Adults will find that the habit of a hearty breakfast and light luncheon gives better results than a light or no breakfast and heavy luncheon.

**Toasted Combination Sandwiches**  
Three large sweet green peppers, 1/2 pound milk cheese, thin slices bacon, 2 or 3 firm ripe tomatoes, bread, butter, 1/4 teaspoon paprika, 1/2 teaspoon mustard.

Four boiling water over peppers and let stand five minutes. Dip into cold water and rub off thin outer covering. Remove stems and take out seeds and white pith. Scald and slip skins from tomatoes. Put peppers and cheese through food chopper and mix with mustard and paprika. Cut bread in thin slices and butter



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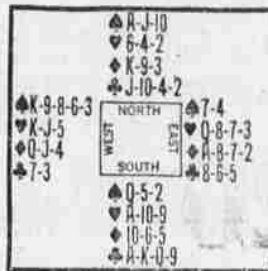


MOMENTS WE'D LIKE TO LIVE OVER THE BIG BLOW.

## Bridge Pointers

Continuing the series of fifty Bridge questions, one of which was submitted yesterday in relation to Deal H. Deal I with two questions in relation to it follows:



South is the Declarer playing a

No Trump contract. The play to the first trick is: West, Six of Spades; Dummy, Ten of Spades; East, Four of Spades.

Question No. 15. Should Closed Hand win this trick?

Question No. 18. With the proper hand winning trick 1, what cards should Declarer lead and play to trick 2?

Answer Blank

Answers  
17. Closed Hand should not take Dummy's Spade trick as it is important to leave the lead in the Dummy.

18. Dummy should lead the Deuce of Hearts, and Closed Hand should play the Nine. This Heart lead is a camouflage designed to clear the adversaries away from the Heart suit.

When South plays the Heart Nine, he anticipates that the trick will be won by West, who then will be in the lead. West, on general principles, probably will avoid the suit which Declarer has started (Hearts) and abandon his Spades on account of the certainty of losing two more Spade tricks. The Clubs in Dummy may steer him

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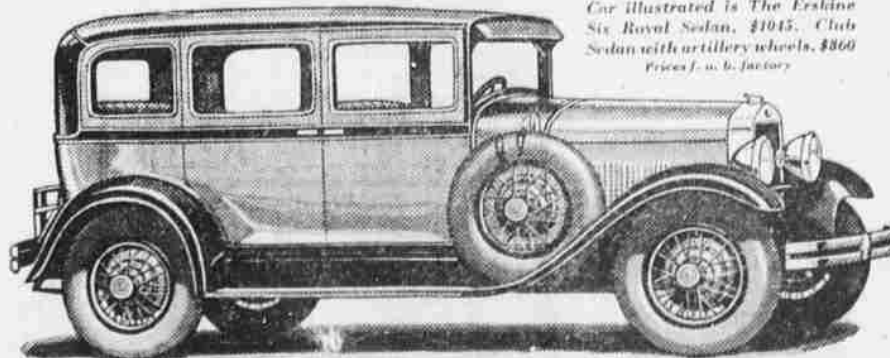

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away from a Club lead and leave him a lead through Dummy's King of Diamonds as a last resort. This is exactly what the Declarer desires. He knows that he can take three Spade tricks, one Heart trick and four Club tricks. He needs a Diamond trick to make game, which he surely can make if the adversaries lead the suit; but he may not make it if forced to lead himself.

## Tunney Marriage Site Is Selected

ROME, Sept. 27—(AP)—A dispatch to Il Messaggero from Sorrento says that the civil marriage of Gene Tunney and Mary Josephine Lander, of Greenwich, Conn., will take place in Sorrento at the hotel "The House of Tasso," where the famous poet who wrote "Jerusalem" was born.

The correspondent pointed out that Sorrento had not been developed at the time of Tasso but that the poet did chronicle some fights between Saracens and Christians and a duel between Argante and Tancredi which was considered good enough as fighting.

The religious ceremony is likely to be held in the sacristy of the Chapel of Mary, Star of the Sea.

## WOMAN'S BODY FOUND

CHICAGO, Sept. 27 (AP)—The badly mangled body of a young woman, identified as Miss Kathryn Leonard, 27, of Oakland, Cal., was found on the Burlington railroad tracks in La Grande, Ill., this morning. Whether the death was an accident or suicide was not known, and the coroner hoped the mystery might be solved on the arrival of several letters Miss Leonard wrote and mailed last night.

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
