TAX COMMISSION CONSIDERS LAWS (Continued from Page 1)

A public hearing should be held, subject to review by the state tax commission, to consider the proposed legislation.

It was also agreed that the commission advise the legislature to enact a law providing "that tax levying authorities shall not levy any millage or centennial tax unless the board, commission, council or other body having jurisdiction shall have enacted a resolution or ordinance directing that the specific levy shall be made for the ensuing year."

Mr. Ingalls had this amended to "except such appropriations as are made on expectation that federal government funds be appropriated for the same purpose." This would save the federal funds now given to O. A. C. for experimental purposes, Mr. Ingalls said.

The commission will ask the legislature to pass a law prohibiting municipalities or any taxing district to issue bonds for airports. It was proposed to do away with the 1-cent levy on property for county roads and substitute an additional 1-cent tax on gasoline.

It was urged that the legislature revise the 2-mill elementary school tax law so that the needy rural districts will benefit by this measure instead of the cities as at present.

NOMINATE FARMER—MIDWINTER, Ore., Sept. 28 (AP)—Alex. Sparrow, farmer and stockman of the Willow Springs district, was nominated for county judge to fill the vacancy caused by the death of W. J. Hartzell. The republican central committee of Jackson county made the nomination unanimously late yesterday.

Filipinos And Mexicans Fight In Yakima Camp

YAKIMA, Wash., Sept. 28 (AP)—Rumblings of discontent and rumors of vigilante committees were heard today among Yakima valley laborers as an aftermath of a pitched battle between Mexican and Filipino workers Wednesday night.

All was quiet in the Mexico district where the fight occurred, following a dispute over women. But rumors of unrest were reported from the Toppensh and Wapato fields from which Filipino workers were forcibly ejected last year.

Farm workmen expressed the fear that the islanders and the Mexicans would invade those districts when the hop harvest at Mexico was completed.

Disputes between whites and Filipinos have been averted by Yakima valley this year by not employing both on the ranches.

The Mexican-Filipino miniature war in which rocks, sticks, knives and guns were used, resulted in the injury of two men. No arrests were made.
