Coolidge Endorses Hoover
BOSTON, Sept. 23 (AP).—President Coolidge in a message read at the Republican state convention here today said that the country needed "a continuation of the administration of public affairs in accordance with the principles which have guided the achievements of the republican party."

"This need," the president said, "should be fulfilled by beginning the new political year under the tried and experienced leadership of Frank G. Allen and Benjamin Loring Young in our commonwealth and Herbert Hoover and Charles Curtis in our nation."

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Herbert Hoover reiterated today that neither he nor the Republican party wanted support on the basis of the religious issue.

His declaration was in amplification of the statement made last night in which he repudiated a circular letter sent out under his

In that letter it was stated that "we must save the United States from being remanned and run-riden and that call is to the women to do so."
