ROME, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Gene Tunney, by dint of Herculean efforts on the part of himself, embassy officials and his old parish priest, Monsignor Joseph A. Breslin, got all the necessary civil and religious paper work essential for his wedding to Miss Mary Josephine Lauder, of Greenwich, Conn., completed this morning.

The wedding is to be a lunch given in the hall by American Ambassador Hays. There were no speeches at interviews and the luncheon was an extremely intimate gathering. The guests included American embassy men in Rome and members of the embassy staff.

Tunney's wrath against photographers finally relented to the extent of the postcard picture before the luncheon. The postcard with Ambassador Hays and with Warren D. Robinson, visiting minister of the embassy, who will be the new United States minister to Salvador. "Yes, I'll pose, if you leave me alone after this," Gene said.

RED CROSS FUND IS STILL SHORT

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Don people in literally destitute condition and dependent on the Red Cross for the necessities of life, the problem is serious. All available trucks have been loaded into service carrying supplies. One hundred fifty tons of food, 700 cots, 2500 blankets sent to the interior from San Juan Wednesday to care for the increasingly serious situation. About 20,000 are ill with influenza, typhoid, and malaria. Red Cross is instituting a drastic health sanitation program with cooperation from the government agencies. Municipal and emergency hospitals are being repaired and others are being established where none had existed before. Dispensaries are being built throughout the area to care for minor injuries. Ten Red Cross nurses leave New York for Porto Rico Friday and the Red Cross is prepared to send 50 more and 15 doctors in event situation demands.

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conference, which would leave only the last two to be discussed by the preparatory commission for the disarmament conference, to which the Franco-British agreement is to be submitted.

Mr. Secretary Kellogg declared, would leave without restriction, surface vessels armed with guns of less than 16-inch caliber and submarines of less than 600 tons. For fighting purposes, he asserted, vessels of this description have a high combat value, particularly to a nation possessing well distributed naval bases.

As to submarines, Secretary Kellogg said:

"The United States would gladly, in conjunction with all the nations of the world, abolish the submarine altogether. If, however, submarines must be continued as instruments of naval warfare, it is the policy of the American government that they should be limited to a reasonable tonnage or number."

In conclusion, Mr. Kellogg invited France to submit to the United States for discussion her disarmament plan of a total "global" tonnage for all classes of fighting ships as contrasted with the American proposal of limitation by specific classes.

This was regarded as a concession to France and a counter-concession to Great Britain, in view of the concession made by the latter to France in the negotiations which led to the accord.

"Such an attitude," he said in a prepared statement, "is entirely opposed to every principle of the Republican party. I made my position clear in my acceptance speech when I said:

"In this land, dedicated to tolerance, we still find outbreaks of intolerance. I come of Quaker stock. My ancestors were persecuted for their beliefs. Here they sought and found religious freedom. By blood and conviction I stand for religious tolerance both in act and in spirit. The glory of our American ideals is the right of every man to worship God according to the dictates of his own conscience."

"I mean that then and I mean it now."

BORAH DEFENDS HOOPER
MITCHELL, R. D., Sept. 29.—(AP)—Senator W. E. Borah, of Idaho, in an address here late yesterday defended Herbert Hoover.
