By Herbert W. Barker (Associated Press Sports Writer) The major league drama is done for another season but the Yankees and the Cardinals will have an epilogue to offer. They meet in the world's series starting at New York on Thursday and ending when one team has won four games.

With both personal enmities already decided, there was not much in interest in the baseball fan in yesterday's closing engagements. Most of the game's faithful stayed away in large numbers, none of them, no doubt, resting up for the excitement that is to come later this week.

Host Wins for Yankees With a \$2,000 bonus an incentive, Walter Roeser, field hander ace of Miller Huggins' Yankees, pitched the American league champion to a 7 to 6 victory over the Detroit Tigers.
