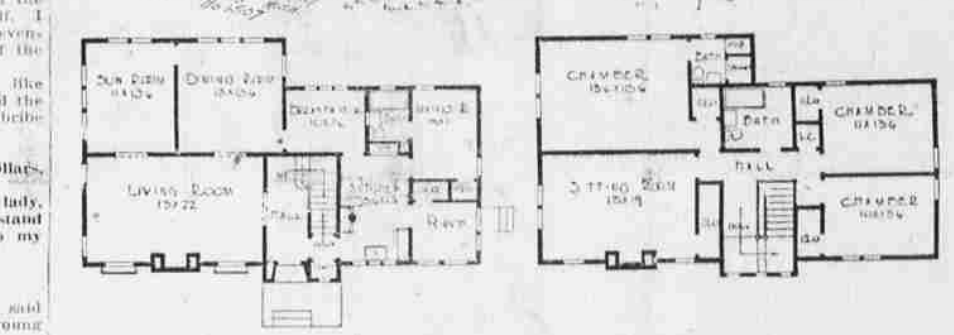

## A HOME WITH A BROAD FRONTAGE



The home here illustrated, has the broad frontage to the street, and would require at least a 60-foot lot, better still, a lot with 75-foot front. The rooms are of minimum size, are planned with a minimum amount of wasted space, the cost therefore is placed at \$19,000 to \$22,000, exclusive of heating and plumbing.

From the center hall entrances, one gets a view through paneled arches of the living, dining-room and sunroom, each room opening up, so as to make an ideal arrangement for entertaining, yet with the maximum amount of privacy.

The kitchen and servants' paragon is most complete. The rear porch is screened, large enough to have an eating porch for a small family. The maid's room and private bath are located on the first floor, and the breakfast room is located off the kitchen, which gives a double door between the kitchen and dining-room.

On the second floor are three room-sized bedrooms, one the owner's bedroom with private bath, as well as a large sitting-room with fireplace. The closets are ample, the rooms all have good wall space and cross-ventilation.

There is a full basement with the usual furnace-room, laundry and dry room, storage and fruit.

The exterior is of frame construction, with smooth white cement plaster on metal lath, red Spanish clay tile roof. The front facade broken by the projected entrance and ornamental iron grills.

Though texture plaster has been used in the main rooms, all finished with the solid float finish for the balance, colored to harmonize with the room decorations. The floors and wainscot of the halls are of oak, with hickory in the kitchen and breakfast-room. Oak trim is used in the main rooms, pine for the balance paint.
