MENUS

BREAKFAST—Fresh plums, cereal cooked with raisins, cream, crisp bacon, buttered pancakes, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Baked macaroni and carrots, sliced tomatoes, cranberry custard, grape juice.

DINNER—Stuffed green peppers, scalloped potatoes, apple and celery salad, ginger bread with whipped cream, milk, coffee.

Cooked carrots and cooked macaroni are reheated in medium thick white sauce well seasoned with cheese to make the luncheon dish. New turnips, cauliflower or onions are good used this way with macaroni.

Stuffed Green Peppers—Four large sweet green peppers, 1 pound sausage, 2 cups sauerkraut. Half or less sausage can be used but either must be par-

bolled first. Put into a sauce pan, add cold water to cover and bring to the boiling point. Boil ten minutes and drain. Remove skin from thick sausage. Cut a thin slice from stem ends of peppers and remove seeds and white pith. Fill peppers with alternating layers of sausage and kraut and replace tops. Tie firmly if necessary and put in a baking pan with about an inch of water. Bake an hour in a moderately hot oven. Cut cord and remove tops to brown sausage a few minutes before serving.

Choose large peppers making one adequate for a serving or use two small peppers for each serving.

LITTLE BULBS FOR THE HOUSE

The easiest pot plants to grow for home decoration during the winter months are the little bulbs. These include crocuses, grape hyacinths, scilla and snowdrops. While too hot and dry atmosphere sometimes causes failures with the narcissus and even the hyacinth, easiest of the large bulbs to grow, the little bulbs are more certain to show a fine bit of color.

Pots of crocuses and grape hyacinths have been attractive exhibits of the flower shows of recent years and have never failed to elicit admiration. Now is the time to start them going. Plant half a dozen bulbs in a five-inch pot and set them away after watering to form roots. Keep the soil damp but not wet. As soon as top growth starts, showing that roots have been formed, bring them to the light. They, too, prefer a moist atmosphere. A saucer with a little water in it under the pot will give this atmosphere. While they are usually rather slow to start into growth, this is to be desired as it will bring their blooming period in midwinter when bloom is most desired.

An even easier way to grow them which is used with success consists of planting the bulbs in pots and setting them in a shady place out of doors, seeing to it that they do not become bone dry. They are allowed to remain until after they have been well frozen. When wanted they are brought into the house, thawed gradually and given a sunny window when growth starts quickly. This gives an imitation of the spring thaws that bring them above the ground so quickly. The grape hyacinths and scilla respond to this treatment.

Lilies of the valley are best grown with this outdoor freezing treatment. While not bulbs, but roots, they are given the same treatment. Buy the prepared pots and pot them up and set outdoors in a convenient spot. They can be brought in as needed during the winter and soon come into bloom.

19. South one no Trump, West Pass, North pass, East Pass.

20. West, Six of Clubs, North, Ten of Clubs; East, Ten of Clubs; South, Queen of Clubs. South plays a false card, hoping that it may induce West to think that his partner has the Jack, and continue the Clubs.

21. South, Queen of Diamonds; East, Six of Diamonds. Declarer, with four Diamond tricks assured, overtakes in North so as to place the lead and so that North will have three Diamond entries if the adverse Diamonds are divided 3-2.

22. North, Trey of Hearts; East, Deuce of Hearts; South, Jack of Hearts; West, King of Hearts. South's plan is, when he next obtains the lead, to lead the Jack of Diamonds, playing small from Dummy; and if both adversaries play Diamonds on this trick, to lead the Ten on the third round of Diamonds, taking in Dummy with ace; this to be followed by a second Heart finesse with an entry still in Dummy in case Dummy's last Heart can be made good.

SYNTHETIC LIQUORS ARE WIDELY USED IN LONDON

LONDON (AP)—The British government has taxed whisky and other liquors so highly that poorer classes are drinking methylated spirits despite the increasing number of deaths and cases of insanity.

It costs about \$1 for a bottle of whisky in England and at this about \$2 in governmental tax. On the other hand a substantial amount of methylated spirits can be obtained for about 12 cents. That much will cause intoxication. Many addicts have recently become insane and the British press is beginning to throw the spotlight of publicity on the situation.

In fall sowing of alfalfa, farmers should remember that fields not already inoculated with the appropriate bacteria must be supplied either by use of pure cultures or by scattering over the land soil from a field known to be well inoculated. To transfer such soil, scrape away the top crust and take the soil for inoculation from the next five or six inches where modules on the plant roots have been growing. From 200 to 500 pounds of soil to the acre should be used.
