WEST COAST HELD STRONG FOR HOOVER

rough industry and on the border from these among those who do not think Mr. Hoover has laid down a definite enough water-power program. They also point out the usually republican Indian vote and the Mexican vote.

Hoover People Alert.

The Hoover people have not been inattentive to the attacks made on their candidate in his home state. Among other things they have distributed pamphlets denying a charge that he employs no white labor on his (Hoover) farm in Kern county, and an accusation that while he was federal administrator he was responsible for heavy losses suffered by the California bean growers.

Hoover has on his side Senator Hiram Johnson, who for years has had a large independent following. Another campaigner for the republican cause is "Jack" Scott, of Los Angeles, a high ranking Catholic layman. Nearly all of the big city newspapers are for Hoover and some at least of the labor leaders who supported La Follette in 1924.

The Hoover managers also claim the overwhelming support of the western voters, who in 1924 were credited with turning the state to Wilson, and who in 1924 are said to have swung to Coolidge. Many women were among the crusaders for William G. McAdoo in Madison Square Garden, and this year McAdoo, at his home in Santa Barbara, is doing what he did most of the time during the last campaign—campaigning on the radio—saying nothing.

While they are claiming a considerable republican shift to Smith, democratic leaders in both Washington and Oregon find themselves facing special obstacles in this Pacific northwestern country both on economic production and tariff issues.

Senator McNary, of Oregon, is one of the authors of the McNary-Haugen bill and is supporting Hoover.

Silent About Smith.

Senator Wesley Jones of Washington state has been one of the outstanding republican dry leaders in congress and his democratic colleagues in this state. Senator Hill is so dry that he is conducting his campaign for reelection without saying much about Alfred C. Smith.

In all three states national difficulties have arisen in both parties. They have reached a very bitter stage in Washington, where republican supporters and opponents of Governor Hartley are far apart. For the time being these divisions in both parties have been on local issues alone, without reference to the national campaign.

Independence Fire Destroys Cannery
