Lines are Weak BUT BACKS GOOD

Harvard, Princeton and Yale All Facing Similar Football Problems

BOSTON (AP)—The big three colleges, each facing its hardest football schedule since the war, will have to overcome similar problems to build up winning eleven this season.

Harvard, Yale and Princeton start training with a wealth of backfield material but with line prospects very few.

At Cambridge, Arnold Horween has two versatile and capable backfields, but he will be forced to depend upon last year's undefeated freshman team for varsity linemen. Harvard's line hopes were shattered in June when Dudley Bell, veteran center, Ralph Stewart, a guard who saw service in the last Yale game, and E. W. Foster, another seasoned lineman, were ruled ineligible.

Good Ends.
Hitch and Levin, Crimson substitutes last season, are expected to be available and Horween will have a capable squad of wingmen to turn over to Eddie Bradford, the new coach. Madison Bayles will act as backfield coach. Horween will again be assisted by "Boskie" Clark and "Duke" Dunn, veteran center and line coaches.

The Crimson eleven, captained this season by Arthur French, a star sprinter as well as a brilliant back, will open the season with Springfield on October 3 and then play North Carolina, the Army, Dartmouth, Lehigh, Pennsylvania, Holy Cross and Yale in that order.

"Duke" Jones will be on the sidelines at Yale this season but his system will be carried on by his successor, Marvin A. "Mud" Stevens. The latter was Jones' first lieutenant for many seasons and he is ripe with experience in the Yale system and is expected to hold to the principles and practices which have brought so many football victories to the line.

Eight Veterans.
Stevens will start the season with eight veterans, half a dozen capable players who were substitutes last season and many worthy candidates who saw service with last year's freshman team.

Graduation day ended the football careers of Captain Webster, a guard; Caldwell and Hamersley, backs; Fishwick and Scott, ends; and Quarrier and Ryan, fullbacks; but Stevens will have Captain Max Eddy at tackle; Greene and Hall, as guards; Garvey, Decker and Hobbs in the backfield and the great Charlesworth again at center.

From last year's substitute squad he will have Wilson, a back; Hall and Hubbard, quarterbacks; Cribb, O'Neil and West, ends; and Keel and Spick, guards; all of whom appear ready for regular varsity berths.

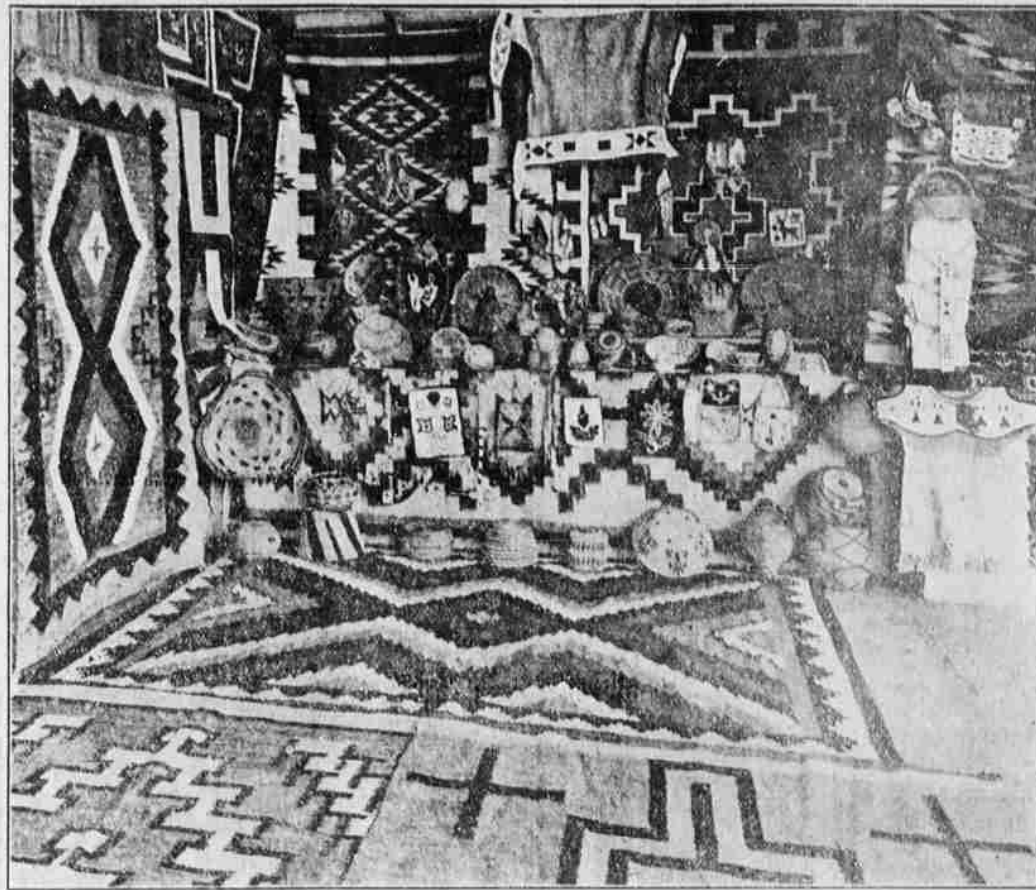
Stevens also will have a bumper crop of youngsters to keep his veteran hunting for places on the first team. Among them is Sandy Wagner, Bill Tibbitt's tennis partner a few seasons ago, who appears capable of earning the first string quarterback's position.

Georgia to Play.
Georgia, which amazed the sport world last season by handing Yale its only football defeat, will visit the point again this season on October 13. After Georgia, Yale will play the Army, Dartmouth, Maryland, Princeton at Princeton and then wind up the season with Harvard at New Haven.

Princeton, which will end its season by playing the navy at Philadelphia, had 13 letters in Palmer Stadium when Bill Roper held the first practice on Sept. 17. The Tiger coach expects to have one of the strongest backfields he has ever assembled in his career but the shiftable condition of his line is already worrying him.

Graduation removed three first-string guards and it is probable that Roper will be forced to put Chuck Howe, captain and a power-
