10,000 FANS AT STADIUM GATES

Lusty Cheers Follow Opening of Doors to World Series Park Today

NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Ten thousand baseball fans were not too slow to join in a lusty cheer when the gates were opened at the Yankee stadium shortly before 10 o'clock for the first game of the world series. Many had stood in line for hours to buy tickets and seats to grandstand and bleachers. Forty one tickets could be purchased by each customer.

Two other million fans passing out the 42 grandstand admissions with eight more destined the bleachers or grandstands. Approximately 40,000 seats in grandstand and bleachers were available.

A deputy police inspector and an inspector were in charge of 150 traffic policemen under a captain. The policemen, 20 mounted men, 21 sergeants and five lieutenants.

500 Fans Stand In Line During Night

NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Five hundred baseball fans, many of them women, who had stood in line for hours, were at the gates of the Yankee stadium when the sun peeped over the horizon today. By nine o'clock the crowd began to swell and the police detail had increased to 6220 policemen, 60 mounted men, nine sergeants, eight lieutenants and a captain.

The crowd was orderly and good natured. The heavy air today was in contrast with other years when the early arrivals were blankets and a stampede to keep their feet warm.

138 TURN OUT ON ROK CALL AT CORVALLIS

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Oct. 4.—One hundred and thirty-eight rook football aspirants have received notice. This large crowd will be cut into two separate squads, one to be called A group and the other B group. Fifty men will be left in the first squad after the cut is made. The use of two teams will give those on the second group a chance to improve and to get into the club team before the season begins. Dick Newman, rook coach, said that he would shift a player immediately to the second team if he didn't make good, therefore giving everyone an even chance.

The rook schedule calls for five games, two of them with the traditional enemies, the Oregon Fresh. The rooks open their season October 13 when they clash with Southern Oregon Normal school at Ashland. Among the 138 aspirants were: Tom Butler, of La Grande, and Korman, of Union.

Every regular except Princeton star who will be out for three weeks with injuries, is making the trip.

Oregon will not be free from injuries, with two of its regulars still on the casualty list. Ted Egan, left tackle, and John Kinnaman, sophomore halfback, are still with strained muscles, but both may get into Saturday's fray.

Because of the rain which has made the field slippery and difficult for the competition games, Stanford is not a six-point favorite.

When fall practice started, Sept. 15, Stanford was favored to beat Oregon by 21 points.

Charles Brown and Clark Galloway are installed at guards with Frank Anthony at left tackle. Tappan works at right end. On defense Hills returns to his tackle berth. Shaw moves over to guard and Brown goes on duty at end. This defensive formation is calculated to embarrass the Oregon tackle as well as to give greater deception Hills becomes a fullbacking threat when he goes back in punt formation.

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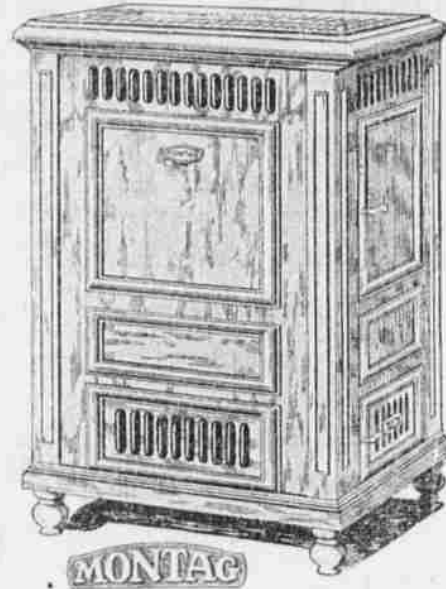

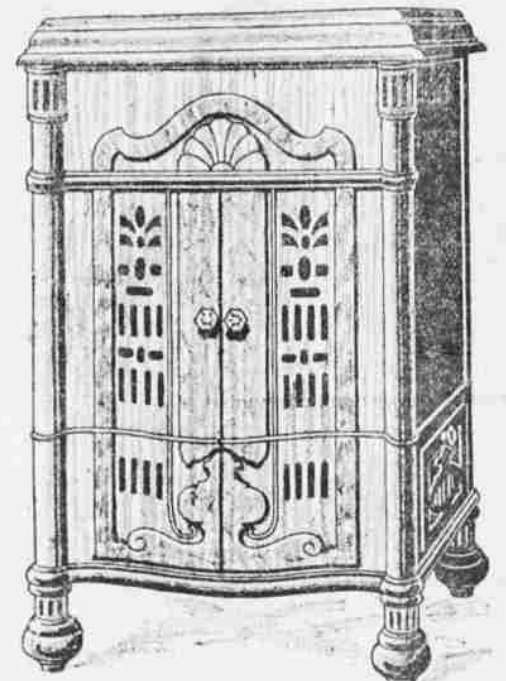
