Reserve Officer Is Barred From Job as Elector

Washington Ruling Answers Oregon Question; Smith Is Attacked By Bishop James Cannon

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5. (AP)—Reserve army officers come within the purview of a constitutional provision which bars government officials from becoming presidential electors, and they should resign if they are candidates, under an opinion handed down today by Major General Lutz Wahl, assistant general of the War Department.

The ruling explained that the War Department had no authority to pass upon qualifications of presidential electors, but that reserve army officers hold offices of profit and trust of the United States.

The opinion was in reply to an inquiry from La Grande, where a reserve officer, who is chairman of the Multnomah county democratic central committee, Oregon. Resigned officers may apply for a new appointment after serving in the election, the department announced.

Ship Wins Fight With Sea Storm; Nearing Boston

NEW YORK, Oct. 5. (AP)—The gale-driven Dutch freighter Chelsea, with a crew of 100, was seen on the coast of New England today as it was proceeding toward Boston under her own steam.

"S. S. Chelsea to all ships," said the last message relayed from the little freighter. "Here everything is all right. We are all well. A previous message had told of the death of one of our crew swept overboard by the heavy seas which for a time threatened to swamp the vessel."

Two crew members which answered her S. S. Wednesday morning, the United States liner America, and the Hamburg-American liner Albert Ballin, were proceeding on their way to New York from the coast of New England.

Word of the safety of the ship was received from Capt. Paul Wicher of the Albert Ballin, whose message said the gale at its height was no longer than his 25,000-ton ship was forced to stop for more than 18 hours an hour while proceeding to the relief of the 4,000-ton Chelsea, 1,000 miles off Newfoundland.

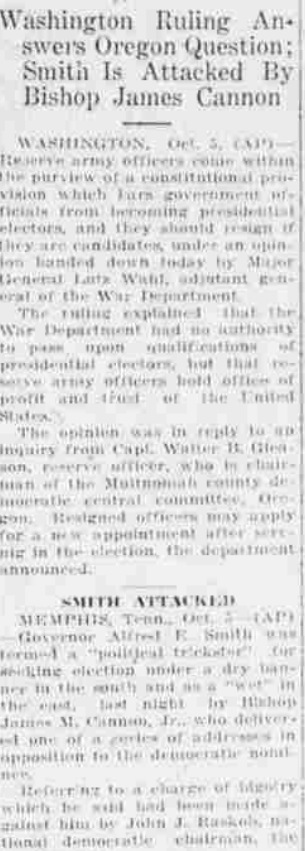

Arrangements were made for him to conduct the executive duties of his office from the Essex county jail. Yesterday he was sentenced to serve two months in jail and to pay fines totalling \$545, because he established a gasoline filling station without a permit.

The mayor had been convicted on numerous charges growing out of the establishment of the gasoline station. He appealed, but later pleaded guilty. He accepted the sentence without a murmur and started the jail term immediately.

The Yankees looked more like cripples and their defense showed weaknesses but there was nothing the matter with their batting slugs when the men from St. Louis, as well as a walk in the first two innings, leading three bases on balls and getting better in a hole with almost every batter, suddenly regained his form thereafter. He allowed only two hits in the last seven innings and only one man, Frisch, got as far as second or third base in that period.
