**DINNER**—Planked ham, melon salad, pumpkin pie.

This planked ham dinner uses end slices of ham to advantage. These cuts are usually less expensive than a "center cut" so the dish has the virtue of economy as well as beauty.

**Planked Ham**  
Ham, sweet potatoes, cauliflower, or 1/2 cup grated cheese, 1/2 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons butter.

Cut ham in slices one-half inch thick. Cut slices in neat two inch pieces, discarding bone and too much fat. Cover with cold water, bring to the boiling point and drain. Rub with a mixture of brown sugar and mustard moistened with vinegar and arrange on a hot plank. Surround with eight halves of cooked sweet potatoes alternating with flowerettes of cooked cauliflower. Sprinkle cauliflower with grated cheese. Boil sugar with a few tablespoons water to make a thick syrup. Spread each sweet potato with syrup and dot with butter. Bake twenty minutes in a hot oven and serve at once.

**NETHERLANDS COFFEE MART**

AMSTERDAM, (AP)—Although scarcely 50,000 bags of coffee are consumed yearly by the people of The Netherlands, more than 2,000,000 enter the country, which has become one of the leading coffee markets of Europe. Most of it comes from Java, Sumatra and other Netherlands eastern possessions, but coffee from Brazil, Central America, India, Africa and Surinam also is handled.
