MENUS

By Sister Mary BREAKFAST—Biscuits of grape fruit, cereal, oranges, soft cooked eggs, fried green tomatoes with cream sauce, toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Cream of lettuce soup, cauliflower au gratin, asparagus, potatoes, grape juice, cookies.

DINNER—Baked mutton, boiled potatoes in parsley butter, creamed sliced turnips, hearts of lettuce with French dressing, Washington cream pie, milk, coffee.

Many people think that mutton is not so strongly flavored if it is boiled rather than roasted. It is sure all the skin is removed before cooking either mutton or lamb in any fashion.

Wash green tomatoes and cut a slice from the stem end. Cut tomatoes in slices about 1/8 inch thick. Sprinkle each slice with salt and pile one on top of the other. Cover with a weight and let stand half an hour. Drain. Dip in fine cracker crumbs, egg slightly beaten and again in crumbs. Sauté in butter, browning first on one side and then on the other. Winter Jewelry Is Red, White And Blue

PARIS, (AP)—The throng of dress scarves and blue colored sport ensembles has died down with the summer sun, but the tricolor goes waving on in the form of costume jewelry for winter.

Ornaments of semi-precious character are blazer and brighter than ever. Some of the new red, white and blue necklaces are half an inch in the wrists of the girls who wear them. They are made of small beads twisted together rope-fashion.

Other colors than red, white and blue are also employed for necklaces, sometimes in a grand judgment of multi-colored beads. Claret necklaces of varicolored glass discs as big as 2 1/2 cent pieces are a phase of costume jewelry.

There are moderate choice colors made of flat metal discs in a variety of shapes. Some are straight like Congo ornaments of primitive derivation. Imitation and genuine Algerian and Moroccan jewelry of gold silver and unpolished precious stones is having a vogue.

Colored costume jewelry is newer than crystal, but the chains of cut stones popular last season are still extensively used. Most of them are longer than they were last season, and instead of reaching a few inches below the throat extend to the waist or hang open like a mantle with loose ends nearly touching the hem of the dress.

Such chains are also worn with the ends hanging down in back, sometimes nearly touching the neck.

New twisted bead collars are copied in coral and small beads of semi-precious quartz like turquoise and jade. They usually have matching earrings which are pearl shaped or built covered with small beads and hung from delicate silver or gold chains.

Bridge Pointers

Continuing our discussion of No Trump take-outs, we find that when made conventionally they afford the opportunity for the interchange of much valuable information.

The conversation between the two partners may be carried on with great accuracy, the bids meaning as follows: The original No Trump opened: "I have at least three suits stopped and a hand which equates at least 11, probably more upon the basis of Ace 4, King 3, Queen 2 and Jack 1." The partner of the No Trump says: "I have two of a Major suit; I bid at least five cards of this Major suit and in it or on the side, or both, I have considerable help for your No Trump. Look at your cards again and decide whether to try for game at my bid, or go back to your No Trump. I am extending to you an option to let me play at the Major if it seems to you that the game is more probable that way, or to rebid the No Trump if that seems to you to be the wiser procedure. You know, I do not, which is the more apt to make game." If, after his No Trump has been taken out by his partner, with a Major-suit bid, the No Trump rebid his No Trump, he is saying to his partner: "I am satisfied that game can be made more easily at the No Trump than at the Major." If the No Trump pass his partner's Major-suit bid, he is saying to the partner: "I believe we will do better with your suit than with mine."

If the bidding is South one No Trump, North two of a Major suit, South two No Trumps, North generally should pass on the second round. But if North do bid three of a Major suit, he is announcing to the No Trump partner that he is justified in insisting upon it, or possibly (quite an unusual case) a Major suit of five cards with four honors, probably some other help for a No Trump, and a conviction that game can be made at the Major trump in spite of the fact that the No Trump prefers
