ROYAL DUEL IN ROME EXCITING

Princes Engage in Sword Thrusts—Romans Expected to Punish Them

ROME, Oct. 8 (AP)—Prince Stauda Potentian, retired governor of Rome, has defended his honor with the sword, according to Prince Lancelotti in a duel and Roman society today was wondering what punishment was in store for the duellists.

Prince Potentian fought to vindicate the honesty of his administration of the oldest functioning municipality in the world in a garden of a villa outside of Rome. His duel was the second to grow out of a rift attributed to Prince Lancelotti that Premier Mussolini had dismissed Prince Potentian because of graft.

Count Di Sarnaby in whose presence Prince Lancelotti was alleged to have been the retired governor immediately challenged him to a duel. They fought with rapier and the count was wounded three times. It is reported that he was suffering from lung disease.

Prince Potentian on hearing that his voluntary defender had been wounded in avenging his honor immediately challenged Prince Lancelotti. The former governor succeeded in "miking" his adversary and the referee stopped the fight.

There never have been any charges in the Italian newspapers against the administration of Prince Potentian. It was understood that his retirement on September 2, when Don Francesco Tompagnoni, Lancelotti, Prince of Montecampione, succeeded him, was due to Mussolini's policy of changing administrative personnel frequently in order to bring up to date "talks" of fascism which would be thoroughly conversant with administrative problems.

Prince Potentian, who was host to Mayor James J. Walker of New York, when he visited Rome last year, returned the visit last May.
