Firpo Training in Buenos Aires For a Comeback Attempt in U. S.

BUEENOS AIRES (AP)—Success in the Buenos Aires fight for an American middleweight champion was not sufficient for Luis Angel Firpo. He refused to return to the fight ring.

Although housed in a luxurious apartment on one of the principal thoroughfares of the Argentine capital, Firpo, so he says, is still looking for the action with the prize money.

He apparently is to have his wishes gratified, for he has several offers, one from Tom Richard said to amount to \$100,000 for a few fights in the United States.

While he has not accepted Richard's offer, the Argentine pugilist has been in training for weeks, trying to regain his former pounds.

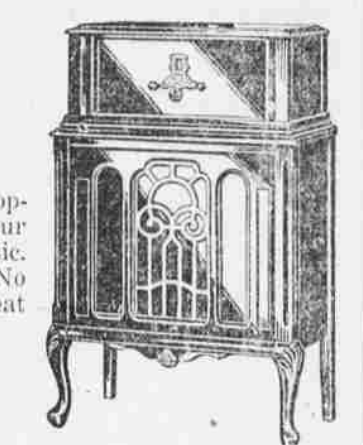
