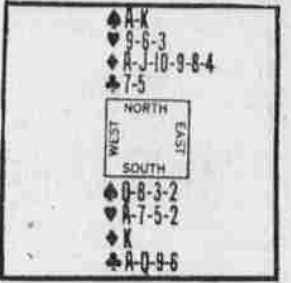
MENUS

BREAKFAST—Bartlett pears, cereal, cream, tomato omelet, crisp toast, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON—Beef broth, toasted crackers, spinach and cheese salad, brown bread and butter sandwiches, jamules, milk, tea.
DINNER—Meat and tomato pie, buttered beans, candied and bacon salad, egg custards, milk, coffee.
Meat left from the steak served in the preceding dinner is used for the meat pie suggested for this dinner menu. Alternating layers of chopped meat and thinly sliced potatoes with minced onion sprinkled through are used for the filling while a baking powder biscuit dough makes the crust of the pie.
Spinach and Cheese Salad
Two cups cooked spinach, 2 packages Neufchatel or 1 package Philadelphia cream cheese, 2 tablespoons oil, 1 tablespoon lemon

Bridge Pointers

We are continuing the series of fifty Bridge questions, one or more of which appear each Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. The answer blanks should be filled before reading the answers which follow.



QUESTION No. 28. Supposing that East and West pass whenever it is their turn to declare, how should South (dealer) and North bid?

With South Declarer and contract No. Trump, the play to the first trick is: West leads the Five of Spades, Dummy plays the King of Spades, East plays the Six of Spades, South plays the Deuce of Spades.

QUESTION No. 29. What card should Dummy lead to trick 2?

Answer Blank.

The Answers

28. South should bid one Club; North, one Diamond; South, one No Trump. South has the strength to start by bidding one No Trump, and a single King is not considered as a No Trump bar; but a No Trump should not be risked with a singleton King unless the hand as a whole is stronger than that held by South.

29. North should lead the Ace of Clubs, salt and pepper, 1 teaspoon granulated gelatin, 2 tablespoons cold water, celery curls.

Cut tender stalks of celery in groups and let stand in ice water to which 1 tablespoon vinegar has been added. When celery curls, drain and keep in ice water until needed. Chop spinach and season with salt, pepper, lemon juice and oil. Let gelatin stand in cold water for ten minutes. Dissolve over hot water and stir into spinach. Mix thoroughly and form into small nests. Chill. Make small balls of cheese and arrange in spinach nests. Sprinkle with paprika and serve each nest surrounded by celery curls.

SHAVEN QUARTET SINGERS

THE SHAVEN QUARTET SINGERS have been a most popular platform attraction for the past ten years. When the radio came into popularity a few years ago, the work of the organization attracted the attention of the management of Station WLS (Chicago), and this group of singers was asked to appear at that station. So busy date was their success that they were engaged by the broadcasting company for a semi-monthly concert, which has been given for some years now. The quartet will feature the old plantation songs and negro folk songs and spirituals.

Of course this lead will drop South's King and make the adverse Queen of Diamonds good, but it is essential for the success of North and South that North's Diamonds be established and run. If North should lead a small Diamond to trick 2 and permit South's King to win the first trick, North's Diamonds could be run only if the six adverse Diamonds were divided 2-2 or 5-1 and the Queen were in the hand that held the short Diamonds—an improbable contingency. By leading the Ace of Diamonds and sacrificing South's King, Dummy can continue Diamonds and establish that suit while he still has the King of Spades for an entry. Played in this way the Declarer is assured of ten tricks; failing to establish Dummy's Diamonds, he could not make more than seven or eight.
