

Walsh Gives Up In Attempt To Save Hickman

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8.—(AP)—Efforts to obtain for a justice of the supreme court an appeal for William Edward Hickman, at Los Angeles, under sentence of death for the murder of Marion Parker, were abandoned here today after counsel for Hickman had vainly urged Justice Butler and Holmes to permit the case to be brought up.

Justice yesterday to obtain an appeal from Justice Vandever, chairman of the committee on pardons, who called early today at the residence of Justice Butler to carry out his program of appealing to each member of the court for a review.

The emphasis he used in urging an appeal had no influence with Justice Butler who refused to order the case brought before the highest court.

DIES OF PNEUMONIA

NEW YORK, Oct. 8.—(AP)—Howard E. Raymond, a director of the R. F. Goodrich company and vice chairman of the board at the time of its reorganization in 1926, died yesterday of pneumonia in his home at Park avenue. He was 64 years old and unmarried.
