Italian Reply To Naval Accord Made

LONDON, Oct. 10—(AP)—The Italian reply to the Franco-British naval accord was delivered to the foreign office Tuesday. The contents of the note, as announced in Rome yesterday, express a desire to obtain parity with any other naval armaments, and favors global limitation in preference to limitation by categories.

FEW BIG GAMES NEXT SATURDAY

Sherwood's Work in Trojan Game Praised — La Grande vs. Enterprise

With Washington State, Stanford and the University of Southern California off to a running start in Pacific coast football conference standings, several other teams will enter into action on the West Coast this Saturday.

Oregon State college, beaten Saturday by the Trojans, will take on a double header to be played in Portland—that will have no bearing on conference standings. Santa Clara will play at Los Angeles in a double header, as it meets St. Mary's, a strong team but not in the conference.

Carlisle vs. F. C. I. A. The Redbirds will play the University of California at Los Angeles in a conference game. All other games will not enter into conference standings. Idaho meets Whitman at Moscow, Oregon plays Willamette at Eugene, Nevada plays Santa Clara at Santa Clara, Gonzaga takes on Puget Sound in Spokane and the California Aggies play Ohio State at Chico, Cal.

Both Oregon teams got off to a bad start last Saturday, the boys from Pop Warner having been crushed by the Webfooters 26 to 12 in a game of veterans vs. sophomores. The Aggies had a shot of bad luck in California, when the Trojans won by three touchdowns, two of them more or less of the "fudge" variety.

The Aggie-Trojan game was the most interesting to local fans, inasmuch as Earl "The" Larson, guard, Carl Gilmour, fullback, Carl Sherwood, halfback, and Howard Kerr, fullback, are all local boys.

Sherwood Given Praise. The Coconino newspaper, in reviewing the game, had the following to say: "Mogie and Sherwood played a whole of a game in the backfield and they point out that Sherwood, sophomore left half, is a boy with a future. Melton and Gilmour also played a great game in the backfield."

Gilmour was injured in Saturday's game but not seriously enough to keep him out of coming contests.

Eastern Oregon high school football is now well under way, with hopes of a few teams already crushed under defeat. Wallawa lost to La Grande 8 to 0 in the Trojans' debut, which was not much of an upset. The real surprise were at Joseph and at Baker. The Baker team was led by Peirce City 14 to 6, an unexpected reverse, and counting in Eastern division standings. And at Joseph, the Union High school squad outplayed Joseph 95 to 0, using all the soph boys had. This week after Wallawa, considered a strong team, won from Joseph 33 to 0, which indicates to some dependents that Union has a much stronger team than early season reports indicate.

Northern Teams All Win. Pendleton romped through Hood River for a win and both Mac-Hi and Wallawa were easily victorious. All three of these games play La Grande and their games

BABE GETS THREE IN ONE DAY



The St. Louis Cardinals seemed to be sitting pretty yesterday in the last game of the world series, but Babe Ruth began to get dangerous. They had a 2 to 1 lead during the early innings, the only score made by the Yankees being a terrific drive by the Bambino over the rightfield fence. Then Babe got going in earnest and, assisted by Lou Gehrig and Dierst, simply wrecked Wee Willie Sherdel and Alexander's futile attempts. Babe got three home runs yesterday, somewhat of an achievement for one game.

RECORD BOOKS RE-WRITTEN BY NEW YORK

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Oct. 10 (AP)—Babe Ruth and the Yankees have re-written the record books for the world's series with the greatest exhibition of hitting power this ancient classic of baseball has ever known. Nineteen record performances for Ruth in four games against the Cards alone tell the amazing story of his batting exploits. Seven more record-hauling or equalling feats by the Yankees as a team, and seven additional marks, the principal ones registered by White Hoyt and Lou Gehrig, bring the 1928 grand total of record performances up to 33.

This astonishing total is more than double the number of record feats this year, when 15 were tallied up as the Yankees bowled over the Pirates. Ruth has a strange hold on nearly all the series batting records, now either holding outright or sharing in 22, running the range from starting home run bats to most strikeouts. He capped the big majority of his own former records and yielded ground in only one spot to Lou Gehrig, who tied the Babe's record of four homers for a single series.

LOSERS' SHARE IS \$4,197 EACH

Cards Divide Sum Among 28 Members As Losing Share

LOUIS, Oct. 10 (AP)—The St. Louis Cardinals found money today in the fact that they will split \$117,526.25, a pooled total for losing players in the world series. They divide their shares into 28 parcels. Twenty-six of the players will receive full shares with four dividing the remaining two.

Ernest Orsatti and Earl Smith received a half share apiece while Clarence Lloyd, the secretary of the club, and Harrison Wagoner, the trainer, get a half share each. Their slice of the million amounted to \$2,993.65.

The following members of the club received \$4,197.26 as their full share: William McKechnie, the manager, Jack Osofsky, the coach, and these players: Alexander, Haynes, Sherdel, Mitchell, Ebbett, Hildt, Littlejohn, G. Wilson, Duntz, Frisch, Macksville, Dierst, Theveson, Hoyer, Douthit, Helm, Harper, Blades, Martin, Rosticker, and Williamson.

The Cards also voted to give \$150 each to the two clubless boys, Kenneth and Roy Sullivan, and to the bat boy, Butch Yatheman.

Sam Hirsdon, owner of the Cardinals, took his own share, to-day's winner of the sale of the franchise of the club. Previous to the series, reports were that he had agreed to sell the club for \$2,000,000.

Although McKechnie's contract to manage the Cardinals expired with the finish of the 1928 season, it is estimated probably that it will be renewed for next year.

Protest Ruling. Brendan joined "Wee Willie" Sherdel today in protesting umpire Pirtman's refusal to call a third strike on Babe Ruth when Sherdel attempted to put over his quick delivery in the seventh inning of yesterday's game. He declared that Pirtman's decision was unfair and that it nullified a smart and nifty play.

"It was a legal delivery," Brendan said. "Ruth was in the box and Sherdel took his windup and pitched the ball right over the plate for a perfect strike. Sherdel is one of the smartest pitchers in the game and Pirtman's mistake was in thinking Sherdel didn't know what he was doing. There is no rule in the National League prohibiting the trick Sherdel attempted. Ruth should have been called out on strikes instead of being proclaimed a home run hero. The Cardinals were winning until that break in the game gave the Yankees their chance. Ruth is a marvelous player and I'm not taking any credit away from him. He outsmarted Sherdel and the umpire and got away with it."

Joyous Yankees En Route Home From St. Louis

EN ROUTE TO NEW YORK with Yankee Social, Oct. 10 (AP)—Like a lot of excited boys or a group of happy school boys from the big game, the Yankees celebrated the night of their world's series triumph in hilarious fashion. The joshing, joking and rough-house tumbling centered about Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig, the club's stars. It spread the length of the train when these two led a campaign to rip off the shirt of every man they met, at once and with as well, if they happened to be in the way. Dusters by the quart were drawn from one end of the special to the other.

Ruth, in high spirits, was the most sophisticated of the group, being accused of putting a cracked egg in Lou Dierst's road pocket and entering the dining room with a pet dog the size of a fox, in hand a chess for the dear-old team.

RUTH BREAKS RECORDS. ST. LOUIS, Oct. 10 (AP)—The record-smashing Mr. Ruth, among other things, hited his twentieth world series batting mark 43 points to a modest 324 by his performance of 10 hits out of 16 official trips to the plate in the four 1928 games. This made five series of 300 or better for the Babe, four of them in succession. He played a leading part in defeating Frank Frisch by having a dual theme of running up five successive and better campaigns. The Fredman flash could have made the grade with a hit in the ninth when Ruth picked the St. Louis star's foul drive out of the hot field before the run with one hand.

DR. WILLING COMING. PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 10 (AP)—Dr. O. P. Willing, well-known Portland doctor who has participated in many national and international tournaments, was the possessor today of a large new Jordan, gift of admiring fellow golfers of Portland.
