BYRD WILL START JOURNEY TO THE ANTARCTIC TODAY

Plan Big Farewell
As the Larsen slips through breakwater, American Legion members, shipping craft, seafarers and citizens will join to give the commander a hearty farewell. The ship will be escorted to the open sea, a distance of two miles to clear the breakwater by harbor vessels, and at sunset the Larsen will have faded from view on the Pacific horizon.

Byrd's plans estimate his arrival at Honolulu about November 3 where the Larsen will join the three preceding ships. A month and a half later he hopes to have sailed further southward, penetrated a 200 mile ice barrier and riding in the open stretches of the Ross sea, approximately 1,000 miles from the pole. Somewhere in this area, his base of operations will be established.

STATE OPENS CASE AGAINST ED FALLOWS

fired in the barber shop and that he gave the gun to the police and asked them to find out "How many shots had been fired."

Tells of Auto Wreck
He testified that the defense would endeavor to prove traces of insanity in FalloWS's family. He also said that FalloWS was in an automobile accident some time before the shooting and suffered an injury that was pronounced to be a slight concussion of his brain.

He finished with the declaration that FalloWS was "emotionally unstable" at the time of the killing.

Dr. Hamilton was the first witness called by the prosecution. He attended Mr. Parry following the shooting and also testified as to an autopsy conducted over his body after death. He said that four bullets entered Mr. Parry's body, one piercing his heart, being the cause of death. In answer to cross examination he said that from appearances all of the bullets had been fired nearly on a level.

Dr. Gilstrap, who assisted Dr. Hamilton in the autopsy, also testified and identified a bullet placed as an exhibit as one taken from Mr. Parry's body.

Eye Witness Testify
B. G. Fritts, an eye witness of the shooting, told the jury what he saw, stating that a man entered the barber shop and shot four or five times at Mr. Parry, who was sitting in a chair with his eyes closed. He said that he could not identify the man.

Henry Warmholz, barber in the La Grande hotel shop, where the shooting occurred, also told his story, declaring that Mr. Parry appeared to be doing when the shots were fired. He identified FalloWS as the man who did the shooting. Both eye-witnesses said neither then exchanged any words before the shooting.

Following the testimony of Mr. Warmholz court was adjourned until 1:30 o'clock this afternoon.

The jury, as impounded, after 45 minutes was examined, followed by J. E. Hays, W. O. Miller, W. J. Hughes, Alex. Lindsay, James McKinnis, William Newman, Fred Gossett, William McWilliams, John Hannan, Fred Neff, William Kirk and D. A. Osborn.

This morning preliminary challenges were exercised by the defense against Morgan Horn and W. E. Melville and the prosecution excused Charles Larson by the same method.
