Is named for the late Count von Zeppelin, German airship builder and inventor, Graf being the German word for Count.

Before climbing into the ship, Dr. Eckener said:

"I expect to reach New York Sunday morning. The last weather reports, dated 2 a. m., speak of heavy storms. Under these circumstances, of course, it is impossible to determine the exact route in advance. In general, however, I can say we will stick to the southern course flying over France and then heading southward to avoid a depression which is moving to and fro between Newfoundland and Ireland. The northern route is out of the question."

May Turn South—
Captain E. A. Lehman, navigation officer, said that it was quite possible that the airship would go as far south as the coast of Africa and then head for the Azores. He said that the most interesting thing about the trip in view of the weather situation was that her navigation would offer opportunities to experts on board for interesting meteorological studies.

All sorts of wild rumors prevailed about the airship. The Zeppelin company's management counseled these with the managing assurance that any unauthorized passenger found after the start would be dropped overboard with a parachute attached.

Two stewards were aboard to look after the needs of the passengers on the trip. There was plenty of provisions, including vegetables, fruit, candies, tea, coffee, beer, mineral waters, beer, wine and champagne. When the American prohibition zone is reached, forbidden drink will be thrown overboard by the management. Will have it placed under seal by customs officers at Lakehurst.

Excited Russian Turned Down—
One excited Russian from Paris rushed into the office at the last minute and paid down \$2,000. He swore he was not a Bolshevik and did not want a hitch, being anxious to sleep in a gateway. To his intense astonishment the offer was not accepted.

A ninety-year-old Berlin woman wanted to travel by Graf Zeppelin to see her son in New York.

Commander Charles E. Rosen, U. S. N., said before going aboard that he had been in Germany and had been very hospitably and well treated.

"I am happy that I have learned to know the men who have put German aviation on such a high plane that nothing but congratulations is due them. Graf Zeppelin will no doubt be an important factor in the development of regular airship service."

FALLS ON STAND TELLS OF SHOOTING—

restored order in the court room. After the wave of laughter, in which Mr. Helm also took part, the judge remarked that politics would not need to enter the case.

Dr. Phyl also expressed the opinion that the defendant will never recover entirely from his insanity.

Court was then recessed until 1:30 o'clock this afternoon. The court room was again crowded to capacity this morning.

Night Session Likely—
When trial took up at 9 o'clock, Circuit Judge J. W. Knowles said that there might be a night session of court this evening in order to get the case to the jury before tomorrow, which is judicial holiday.

The state rested its case yesterday afternoon, after calling Police Chief Clint Hynes, Traffic Officer Claude Cooper, Mr. Devine and Sheriff Jess Broadbent on the stand. The efforts of the state yesterday were confined more or less to establishing the fact that Fallows shot Parry.

A recess was called and then the first of the defense witnesses took the stand before a court room that was crowded with around 250 spectators, two-thirds of them women.

Six Character Witnesses—
James Rugg, Guy Ellis, Louis Evans, Dr. A. N. Mayville, Beth Siering and W. G. Sawyer all testified to the prisoner's general reputation as being "good" and "very good" over a period of years.

Louis Evanson, of Pendleton, testified that one of his brothers committed suicide about four years ago for no apparent reason and that the dead man was of a nervous type.

William Fallows, the prisoner's father, told of nervousness in his family and of one son, Guy, attempting to commit suicide because of correspondence with a girl. He testified that Guy doesn't remember the details of the attempted suicide clearly. He also testified that his son and daughter-in-law were happy until Parry came into the case, after which Fallows became worried, acted unusually, scratched his head frequently and could hardly sleep or talk of anything but his domestic troubles.

Tells of Nervousness—
Ruth Fallows also testified that her brother, Eddie, was unusually nervous before the killing and she said that they had never had any trouble before that with Parry. She also testified that there were girls who refused to go into Parry's shop because of his mink and improper advances toward them.

Eddie Allen, taxi driver, told of receiving a call from Parry at Fourth and Lane, near the Fallows home and Claude Lester, who accompanied Allen, verified his statement.

Oscar Rice, a policeman, told of being called to the Fallows home the night of July 31 by Ben Hummel, another policeman. They entered the house and found Mrs. Fallows and Parry in the home.

Punished Wounded Parry—
Mr. Hummel warned the stand and both policemen testified that Mr. Rice had warned Parry to stay away. At the time, they testified, Eddie gave Mr. Hummel a pistol. The policemen testified that Eddie had a chance to shoot Parry then, but did not make any attempt to do so.

The defense then called the district attorney, Carl Helm, who testified that Fallows had come to his office after the police had visited the Fallows home and asked if the district attorney's office could do anything to relieve the situation.

Mr. Helm said that he told the prisoner that he could file a charge against Parry but that it wouldn't do any good unless he filed a charge against his wife also. Fallows then suggested divorce and went into H. E. Linton's office.

When the defense concluded, Mr. Helm waived cross-examination of himself.

Police Chief Hynes was called to the stand and said that he had also been approached by Fallows and had told him to go to the district attorney.

Tells of Poison Threat—
Margie Fallows, 15-year-old sister of the prisoner, testified that Mrs. Fallows had threatened to take poison if she told her brother that Parry visited there.

Mrs. William Fallows, mother of the prisoner, stated that Eddie was hurt about May 29 in an automobile accident and that a physician pronounced the injury as commensurate with the brain. She also charged that after Parry entered her husband's domestic life, Eddie couldn't sleep or seem to get his mind off his troubles. She stated that at times her son did not feel normal.

Disconnected Telephone—
She said that the son thought Parry was not only after his wife

but also his property and told of Eddie disconnecting the telephone wires at his home the morning of the shooting so that Parry could not call his wife.

George Keller also told of the auto wreck. He was riding in the car at the time it turned over.

Mrs. Fallows, the prisoner's wife, took the stand about four o'clock and for more than an hour, told a sad story of undue familiarity with Parry over a period of about six weeks. She said that she feared to tell her husband because she loved him and said that she might lose him, and she said that she continually resisted Parry's advances but that he persisted. She declared that until Parry entered her life, she had never had any affairs with other men.

She testified that after her husband and Parry at her home, she and Eddie patched things up but Parry still attempted to force his advances on her. She also related that Parry told her that he would be prepared for her husband if he stated trouble and testified that she told her husband of Parry's statement to that effect. The defense claimed in opening statements yesterday morning that when Fallows went to Parry's shop Aug. 6 he took his gun with him for self protection.

Tells of Quicker Actions—
Mrs. Fallows, who maintained her composure throughout her period on the stand, said that the night her husband and policemen visited the place that Parry later lived in a hotel, telling her that her life was in danger.

She testified that Eddie was always nervous, especially after being injured in the auto wreck and that he acted queerly on the morning of the shooting.

Shortly after 2 o'clock, with the defense showing cross-examination, court was adjourned by Judge Knowles until this morning with Mrs. Fallows still on the stand.

Mrs. Cooper was 75 years of age and had been a resident of La Grande for the last 11 years. She was born in Canada and married George Cooper in 1892 in Michigan.
