MENUS

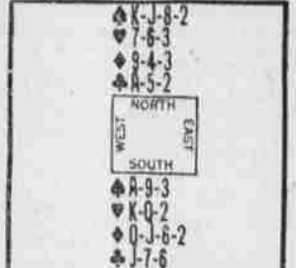

BREAKFAST—Omelet, cantaloupes, scrambled eggs with rice, toast, coffee, honey, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON—Creamed oysters on toast, stuffed celery, apple crisp, milk tea.
DINNER—Pot roast of beef, brown gravy, mashed potatoes, baked sweetbreads, head lettuce, grapes, milk coffee.

The baked sweetbreads suggested in the dinner menu offers an excellent way to use up left-over vegetables. All green beans or all lima can be used if only one part is at hand. Left-over corn-on-the-cob can be cut off and used and a few tablespoons cooked tomatoes or one raw one cut in small pieces can be used in place of the bit of lemon juice.

Baked Succotash
One cup cooked lima beans, 1 cup cooked green beans, 1 cup cooked corn, 1 tablespoon minced green pepper, 1 tablespoon butter, 1/2 cup milk, 1 egg, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon sugar, 1/2 teaspoon lemon juice.
Combine vegetables. Beat egg until light and beat in milk. Add butter, salt, lemon juice and sugar and add to vegetables. Mix well and turn into a well-buttered baking dish. Bake 20 minutes in a moderate oven. Serve from baking dish.

Bridge Pointers

Contract Bridge
Contracting our series of Contract Bridge takes from actual play, in which North and South do all the bidding, East and West passing whenever it is their turn to declare, we will today look at the following hand:



Make up your mind how this hand should be bid by South and North before reading the explanation that follows.

The Bidding
South would bid one No Trump. He has three suits stopped and his hand counts the 13 needed to meet the full requirements of the Contract No Trump bid. He also has an evenly divided hand (an important element of strength for No Trump) and while the fourth suit is not stopped, the holding in it (Jack and two small) may be of great value.

After South's No Trump and West's pass, North, while tempted to jump to two No Trumps, should pass. His hand counts 5, just enough under the requisite for jumping partner's one No Trump to two. The only 5 count with which one No Trump should be jumped to two, is a holding of two Aces; and even that jump is a little doubtful.

It will be noted in this hand that there would be no chance whatever for North and South to make game at No Trump. How many tricks they would win would depend upon the suit selected by West for his opening bid and the location of the Queen of Spades and Ace of Hearts; but it is safe to assume that when South sees his Dummy, he will be glad that his contract is not for more than seven tricks. Furthermore, whenever possible to bid for game, it is wise to obtain the contract as cheaply as possible.

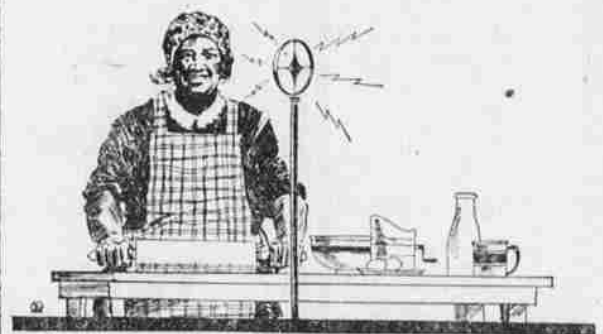
