MEDICAL MEN DISAGREE AS TO INSANITY

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that people outside were talking about him when they were not asked about this, Dr. McNary said in his opinion this was probably curiosity, and not insanity.

Other witnesses
Proceeding Dr. McNary on the witness stand were the following practicing surgeons and physicians: Dr. V. L. Hamilton, Dr. C. E. Moore and Dr. M. K. Hall, of Portland. All three gave as their opinion that

the defendant was insane at the time of the shooting. "It is very likely that he had an acute psychosis of the delusional variety," Dr. Moore said. "I think that he was insane."

Dr. Hall said: "I would say that the man was insane" and Dr. Hamilton was also of the opinion that Fallows suffered a delusion at the time of the shooting and that from the placing of the bullets in Parry's body, it would indicate random shooting.

District Attorney Carl Helm conducted a piercing cross-examination of each of the three witnesses. It was testified by defense witnesses that suicide is indicative of insanity and one of the doctors testified that insanity itself is sometimes hereditary. Dr. McNary declared that insanity is never hereditary in itself and that suicide cannot be taken as a sure symptom of insanity.

During the "battle of opinions" yesterday afternoon, the court room was filled to overflowing with women again in the majority. There were cases of persons who came to the court room yesterday morning with their lunch, eating it outside during the noon recess and returning for the afternoon session.

Tells of Headaches
Several other witnesses were called by the defense during the afternoon session, including U. S. Lotter, who testified that Fallows was very easily excited and nervous and that his reputation was "very good." The prisoner was recalled to the stand and was asked if he suffered from headaches and dizziness. He replied: "Terrible."

Everett Keown testified that Parry's reputation was bad, and Helen Fallows, 12, and Marjorie Fallows, both sisters of the defendant, were on the stand for a few moments.

Throughout the day, Circuit Judge J. W. Knowles, presiding, endeavored to speed things up with the hopes of getting the case to the jury last night but finally, before court adjourned at 4 o'clock last evening, decided it was impossible to achieve so he adjourned court until tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock. Today is a judicial holiday.

Case Nearing Jury
Court observers are of the belief that testimony will be concluded and arguments started tomorrow morning, with the case reaching the jury's hands sometime in the afternoon or early in the evening.

According to the Oregon laws, the jury may return verdicts of not guilty, guilty of first degree murder, guilty of first degree murder with recommendations of life imprisonment, guilty of second degree murder or guilty of manslaughter.
