Much can be said of the climate that permits year-round blossoms and never-changing green, but we confess a preference for variety as a happy spur to each season's renewed appreciation.

AGAINST THE LAW TO DRINK WATER

One of the major disadvantages of initiative legislation is the privilege it gives any individual or small group to put any kind of measure on the ballot regardless of the idiotic provisions it may carry. The four bills designed to restrict the Rogue, Deschutes, McKenzie, and Umpqua rivers to sportsmen's fishing are an example. They will appear on the ballot next month and must be voted on by the people of Oregon.

The Eugene Register pointed out recently just how impossible these bills are by saying that, if they were approved by the people, it would be illegal for anyone even to take a drink of water from any of these four rivers, that a man could be arrested for such a thing or any other act than fishing in these specific streams.

Actually, no such enforcement would be made, but the fact shows to what extreme the framers of these measures have gone to try to preserve good fishing grounds for those who enjoy sport with rod and reel. Four large and extremely important rivers in various sections of Oregon restricted to fishermen. Everyone else keep out in the name of the law!

If the bills should pass, fishermen would have exclusive playgrounds which they already enjoy. But consider the loss to others and to Oregon. None of the waters in any of these four rivers could be used in the future for irrigation. None could be used for municipal water supply. None could be used for power development. None could be used for reclamation, for logging or sawmill operations. All four rivers could be used for just one purpose—fishing. Regardless of the need in other directions, regardless of the fact that fishing has already been permitted and enjoyed in these streams many years—regardless of all circumstances, there could be no compromise, no joint usage. Fishing and fishing only. That's the purpose of the four bills on the November ballot relating to the Umpqua, the McKenzie, the Deschutes, and the Rogue.

We are not really alarmed over these bills if voters will study them and try to determine definitely what their provisions mean. If they do that, we can hardly conceive of even the most ardent sportsman voting for these measures at the expense of the development and benefit of the entire state. Fishing is an important asset in Oregon, but certainly not the most important asset when considering four great rivers within our borders. It has hardly reached the place where it deserves first consideration, with everything else in second place. The four river measures should be defeated, and will be.

O. S. C. Preparing For Double Bill In Portland, Ore.

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Oct. 12—Oregon State college football team which was badly wrecked when the Oregonians took a 13 to 9 triumph from Southern California Trojans last week, is gradually getting into shape again. Earl Metten, a half-back, is the only real casualty. Metten, who had his right foot broken, will more than likely see the remaining football games on the Oregon schedule this year from the side lines. Ralph Twitchell, another half-back, who was injured in the opening days of practice, was back in a suit again today. The loss of Metten in the backfield has caused Coach Schneider to do a little shifting of his players. If Twitchell recovers from his leg injury in time for the next conference game with Washington State at Pullman October 29 the situation will not be so bad. Twitchell is a two-year letterman who will be back to keep off the first string. He is a great punter, passer and pass receiver. He will be well able to take care of Metten's position. Earl Schuyler, a sophomore half-back, will more than likely step into one of the backfield positions. Schuyler was star of the Oregonians in the mix with Southern California last Saturday. The Oregonians play a double header with Columbia and Pacific universities at Portland Saturday. This game, a non-conference clash, will give Coach Schneider a chance to get a line on his new backfield which he intends to use against Washington State. The starting lineup for the first game which will be with Columbia is: Draper and McGivern, ends; Root and Reed, tackles; Hughes and Larson, guards; Bokum, center; Wood and Owen, fullbacks; Buerke, quarter; and Nicholson, full. The first game is called for 7:30 o'clock. Four quarters of 15 minutes each will be played in both games.
