Authentic Court Room Scenes In Picture

The late P. T. Barnum once said, "You can't fool all of the best part of the time." He might have had notion picture making in mind, as well as the circus, because producers, realizing this, strive to employ every bit of realism possible in the production of pictures. And as the art progresses, the more perfect they become.
