A group of tableaux entitled "Heroes on the March" will be given. They are said to be an exceptionally interesting and important group of pictures.

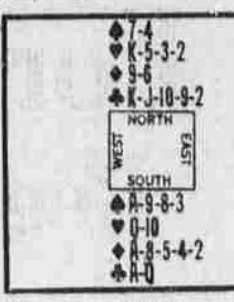

Bridge Pointers

Continuing this week the series of fifty bridge questions which we have been publishing on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays, we give today Deal P.



Deal P. South Dealer, contract No Trump, score level. East and West have no bid. To trick 1, West leads the Six of Hearts. Dummy plays the Queen; East the Jack and South the Ace.

QUESTION No. 26. What card should South lead to trick 2?

ANSWER: South should lead.

26. To trick 2, South should lead.

ANSWER: South should lead the Ten of Hearts.

He is sure to take seven tricks in addition to the trick already won—one Spade, one Diamond and five Clubs. This makes a total of eight tricks—one short of game. It is possible that by leading Diamonds three times, he could establish that suit, which would make up two additional Diamond tricks. But the chances are that the adverse Diamonds are not evenly divided and what is more serious, that while South is clearing his Diamonds the adversaries will establish Spades and, with the two Diamonds and the Ace of Hearts, they surely will take enough Spade tricks to save game.

There is little chance for South to make game with Diamonds, and absolutely none to make an extra Spade trick; but he has a certainty of game by making one more heart trick provided he establishes hearts before Dummy's entry is lost. If South should lead the Ten of Hearts to trick 2, it would not matter whether the adversaries win that trick or not. If they do not, it ensures game for Declarer; if they do, it establishes North's King of Hearts and North has a Club entry with which to cash it.
