Rail Tunnel At Weatherby Open Tuesday Morning

At 11:30 o'clock yesterday morning the new O-W-R & N. tunnel located in a mile east of Weatherby was opened when an east bound freight train passed through it. The tunnel was completed and ready for use by 10 a. m. yesterday after several months work. It is 590 feet long and runs through a hill in the River region. The purpose of the tunnel is to take care of train traffic while the old tunnel is being repaired. The new tunnel is located parallel to the old one at a distance of about 75 feet. It is being constructed on the inside, the concrete to replace the old construction formerly used. The concrete will be permanent while the wooden structure had to be replaced at frequent intervals. Both tunnels are 500 feet long. The tunnel will eliminate the fire hazard present in a wooden lined one.

With the completion of the regular of the old tunnel within the next two months, the Eastern Oregon improvement program for this season will have been completed, says W. H. Gault, O-W-R & N. division superintendent.

"What can I tell America?" he asked with a smile. "Americans know everything." He told of his pleasure in seeing so many correspondents whom he had often met during the war. "My heart is with you Americans, one and all," he concluded.

One-Man War In Ireland Stops; His Fort Taken

CORK, Irish Free State (AP)—A one-man war in Ireland has come to an end. An armistice has been declared between the Irish Free state and Cornelius Healy, known as the "one-eyed gunner of the Scaevant."

For five years the one-eyed gunner has been the most sought after man in the Free State. When Don Valera ordered his followers to cease fighting some five years ago, the one-eyed gunner had only just begun.

Since then he marched up and down the country with a machine gun over his shoulder, waging war on his own account.

When the Free State decided that Healy had better be given free lodgings at the state's expense, police and soldiers were sent after him to tell him the tidings. He avoided their clutches. Several times he dashed from houses which were surrounded by police.

But at last the Free State police heard that the one-eyed gunner was at his home near Cork. They waited until night. Then they surrounded his home, and carried the fort by surprise.
