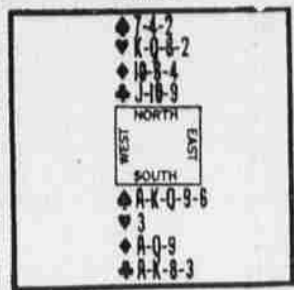

Bridge Pointers

Today we have Deal II with two questions.



South Declarer, contract two Spades; score love-all. West has bid two Hearts. Trick 1, West leads the Deuce of Clubs; Dummy plays the Nine; East plays the Seven.

QUESTION No. 23. What Club should Declarer play from Closed Hand?

QUESTION No. 46. After exhausting the adverse trumps with three leads, what card should Declarer lead from Closed Hand to trick 5?

The Answers

39. South should play the Ace of Clubs; he knows that he will not take more than three Club tricks. He is anxious to utilize Dummy's Hearts, but has no entry for that purpose unless he can create one by establishing one of Dummy's Clubs. This he can do by winning the first trick with either the Ace or King of Clubs. The Ace play is given because it is a false card.

40. South should lead the Trey of Hearts to trick 5.

The Ace of Hearts is marked in the West hand by the Heart bid; consequently it must be played or North will win the trick. If West should play small, Declarer could win five Spades, one Heart, three Clubs and at least one Diamond game. If West win trick 5, five-odd is assured. If, to trick 6, West lead either a Heart or a Club, South will be able to win two Heart tricks in Dummy and discard from Closed Hand; if West continue with a Diamond, it will be up to South's tenace.

Investigating Mystery Around Tuscola Death

TUSCOLA, Ill., Oct. 15.—(AP)—Water McAllister's death in a grade crossing crash last week had become today something of a mystery.

McAllister was a farm hand, working on Earl Carroll's place. He was killed about 2 o'clock last Friday morning when the automobile in which he and Carroll were riding was struck by a train at the crossing of a lonely country road. There was nothing about the accident, a coroner's investigation found, to mark it from any other grade-crossing tragedy. Since the incident, however, the state's attorney's office has become interested, chiefly because of five insurance policies on the farm hand's life.

Each policy names as beneficiary Mrs. Emil Carroll, wife of the dead man's employer, or the "McAllister estate." There also were three other policies on McAllister's life, but they were not indicated in whose favor they were drawn, or the amounts.

There are other circumstances under investigation. A mysterious attack upon McAllister two weeks ago at the Carroll farm is one of them. The state's attorney was told that the farm hand was severely beaten while walking to the Carroll cowshed. No report of the assault was made at the time.

Another circumstance was the inquiry in which McAllister's body was found following the automobile accident. Dr. Lorrer, who took the farm helper's body from the machine, said it was wrapped in a blanket. Members of the train crew also testified at the inquest that McAllister's legs were held together by a blanket. McAllister's shirt was fractured in front and torn behind.

Carroll's account was that McAllister was on his feet, trying to get out of the car when the train struck. Carroll escaped with slight cuts and bruises.

ZEPPELIN STAMPS SOUGHT

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—(AP)—Cancelled stamps on envelopes and postcards brought to this country by the Great Zeppelin are causing keen competition among stamp collectors and dealers, with \$2 income required annually for the four mark stamps on envelopes and \$2 for the two-mark stamps on postcards.

PARIS (AP)—There are no hems to let out on the newest sport clothes. Hems are out of favor and in their stead Paris uses rows of machine stitching to finish wool sport clothes. The same method is used for cuffs and collars at some of the leading houses of sports apparel. Tweeds are the cause of the change. They do not hang well, dressmakers say, when finished with hems which have to be put in on the bias, since most of the current season's sport skirts are more or less circular.

Colored leather with linings of printed velvet is also in favor for motor and stormy weather coats. With such coats go handbags and storm hats of printed velvet to match the coat lining.

MENUS

By Sister Mary

BREAKFAST—Baked apples, cereal, cream, scrambled eggs with fried dried beef, Graham gems, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Cream of celery soup, creamed scalloped tomatoes and onions, chocolate bread pudding, cream sauce.

DINNER—Veal en brochette, cauliflower in white sauce, pickled beets, green tomato pie, milk, coffee.

When a cream soup as well as a pudding made with milk is used a fruit drink can be served with good effect to children. The luncheon menu is an excellent example of this type of meal.

Veal en Brochette

One pound lean veal, 3 sour apples, 3 onions, 4 thin slices salt pork, salt and pepper.

Choose apples and onions as near the same size as possible. Pare apples and cut in slices about 1/4 inch thick and remove cores, making rings. Peel onions and cut in slices about 1/4 inch thick. Cut meat in pieces about the same size as the apples and onions. Arrange these ingredients on skewers, putting first onion, then meat and then apple, pressing close together and using two pieces of each. Sprinkle with pepper and use salt sparingly. Wrap a thin slice of salt pork
