UNDERSIZED EGG PRICES GO HIGHER

Butter Values Steady—Whole Milk Quoted 20 Cents Up in Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 18 (AP)—Increased local demand for undersized eggs on account of the high prices prevailing for standard and medium grades was reflected today by a 3c increase in price to 27c per dozen. Other grades were firm at the session and the feeling along the street this morning was fully steady to strong.

In the butter division, values were steady today on all grades but extra firsts which were quoted a cent lower at the exchange session at 47 1/2c per pound.

Whole milk was being quoted 20c higher at \$2.85 per cwt., but no changes in butterfat prices were noticeable.

Lamb Supply Large

Lambis were not moving out very well on local country dressed meat markets this morning, while fresh killed stock continued to arrive in large quantities, causing the commission brokers in commission house, colliers. The price on best lambs was around 21c but most sales were around 19c to 20c. Veal and hogs were unchanged, with receipts of both more than sufficient to satisfy demand. In the poultry markets there were no price changes, although receipts were light and trading fairly active.

The poultry which has prevailed in the vegetable and fruit markets of late is still noticeable. On a side of mushrooms in tomato prices at 75c to 85c per box, there was nothing especially noteworthy. Cranberries were plentiful, selling steady at \$5.75 per 1/2 barrel box.

Higher Prices Expected

Commission men look for a higher price scale before the holiday buying commences. Oregon and Washington had a small crop this year. It is pointed out, while eastern markets also yielded considerably less than usual.

Dry onions were firm; Oregon growers going to the trade at \$2.25 to \$2.50, while Yakima Spanish type offerings averaged about 25c per sack less.

Movement of potatoes was fair today at steady prices. Deschutes gems were being offered in greater quantity. No. 1 grade fetching \$1.25 to 1.50 per sack.

spiritedly began the concert to the last grand, crashing climax which was "March Down to Jordan, Hallelujah."

Miss Lewis, contralto, sang "The Song is Ended" and the "memoryingers on" in the minds of many who heard it.

Negro spirituals were sung in a way which set them apart from other songs. "In these spirituals we attempt to portray something of the spirit of our people in slavery days," Mr. Shaver said. But the audience needed no explanation for who couldn't get the meaning back of "Old Black Joe, when LeRoy W. Jennings sang it. One of the finest contralto voices heard in La Grande for a long time was enjoyed when Miss Lewis sang "Ome, Ome Belts"—one of the outstanding numbers of the program. She also sang "Carry Me Back to Old Virginia."

With a thrill of triumph, the chorus sang "Way Down South in Dixie," and when they sang together, they entered so into the spirit of their songs that they almost brought them to life. "Pickin' Cotton" and "Swinging on the Golden Gate," and "Playin' Music on the Old Banjo," and "A High Old Time" and the "White Ole" and "Down" were some enjoyable numbers.

The little things which gave the old plantation colored folks pleasure because they didn't have anything else were told about in the song with the pathetic meaning. "All God's Children Got Wings," Mrs. Jameson Weather, soprano, sang "My Old Kentucky Home" and poured it right into the hearts.

With a versatile voice, Mrs. Weather sang old plantation songs and then the jubilee songs, for instance, "Hand Me Down That Silver Trumpet," "Little David, Play on Your Harp," the jubilee song Mr. Shaver sang, was one of the treats of the evening. A subtle and delicate now and then brought to the faces of the audience who heartily laughed.

Perhaps, though, one of the very funniest of the funny actions was when Mr. Jennings "flew up to heaven," calmly and naturally. Two accompanists, Gertrude Jackson, played two pipe organ numbers which were popular encore. The second number was "Mighty Like a Rose."
