Second Week Of "Tarzan" At Colonial

A Central African jungle was built on the lot at Universal's studio for the filming of "Tarzan the Mighty." Universal's thrilling chapter, the second chapter of which will be shown here at the Colonial Theater Friday, "The Love Call" is the title of the second chapter, the first, "The Terror of Tarzan," having started last week.

On an area covering forty acres Universal planted thousands of jungle plants which had been brought from Africa, kept in a hot house on the lot and immediately put into the ground at the studio. Quick production was necessary to shoot the scenes before the plants died as a result of the change of climate. The work was done under the supervision of men who had lived for years in the real jungles of the Congo.

A scheme of concealed wires was employed to keep the wild beasts from escaping. The wires, strong enough to hold back the attacks of a lion or an elephant, were surrounded by the plant growth. Even the beasts did not know where they were until they dashed against them.

"The Love Call" is one of the most thrilling chapters in "Tarzan the Mighty." A synopsis of the first chapter is shown on the screen, so those who did not see the beginning may still know how the story goes. Jack Nelson directed under the supervision of William Lord Wright.

Frank Merrill plays the starring role of Tarzan, while the cast includes Natalie Kingston, Al Ferguson, Robbie Trevor and Larimer Johnston.

Billie Dove At The Arcade In "Night Watch"

Unity of time, place and action is always valuable though by no means often employed on stage or screen as Aristotle would have hoped for.

In "The Night Watch" starring Billie Dove, which comes to the Arcade Theater Friday, the action is mostly on board a French cruiser on the eve of the World War. A French courtroom is the only other scene of importance. Most of the important scenes take place during a night—the night before Armageddon.

The story centers about one woman and three men. The woman is Miss Dove, wife of the captain of the cruiser. Donald Reed is one of the men, who would like to be her lover; Paul Lukas is the captain; Nicholas Soussain is the cynical and revengeful heavy.

About the quartette is woven a drama that is one of the most poignant ever conceived. Alexander Korda, who directed the picture, has given it the true European atmosphere and quality. The scenes are all effective, the drama is convincing and it is declared that in no recent Epit National picture, has the beautiful star appeared to better advantage.

The settings are really superb. That on the turret deck of a cruiser, with the enormous guns and the various trapping of the sailors and the activity, is exceptional. These match with actual ship scenes made at sea. Then the French court, so different from those in this country, the brilliant assemblage of officers in their glittering uniforms, lending an air of distinction and unimpaired to the tribunal.

captulated as it occurred, showing how the wife fought for her honor and how the actual crime was committed.
