Rev. Edward Brady in Rochester, N. Y., who was one of Hickman's first spiritual advisers after he entered San Quentin.

Hickman awoke at 2 o'clock this morning, his last day on earth, after a short but sound sleep. He was as indifferent as he has been during the greater part of his imprisonment, and chatted freely with the two guards who watched him through the night.

**Reviews Career.**—He reviewed his entire career in his talks with the guards, from the first time he held up a drug clerk to the kidnapping and murder of Marian Parker. "This was the most atrocious crime in history," he said.

A big breakfast sat practically untouched at Hickman's elbow as he chose to spend the last few moments of his life with Father Fleming.

The smile, photograph upon which he played antiquated, syncopated music until a few hours before the execution time, was silent. The flowers which were placed about the death cell yesterday at his request were slightly wilted but still gave a slight warmth to the cheerless room where some two hundred men have awaited death.

When he was asked for a few jazz songs sounded through the darkness of the barren walls. The execution chamber was filled to capacity with witnesses.
