THREE BIG GAMES ON COAST TODAY

State Colleges Meet at Fullman; Washington Plays Oregon

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 20 (AP)—An audience made a few hours before game time today placed 20,000 fans in the stands of Multnomah civic stadium to watch the University of Oregon and the University of Washington football games in their annual "big game." At midnight Friday it was announced that the seat sale had already passed the record mark for football games in Portland.

Both teams held a light workout on the field yesterday afternoon. Coach McLean, of Oregon, took no chance of having his players' feet swelled last night and immediately after the workout took them to the Waverly Country club some distance out of Portland, where they spent the night. The Washington squad was quartered at a downtown hotel.

Washington Favored—Raffing odds on the game favored Washington. The bookies were quoted at 10 to 7 1/2 by the spectators. This despite the rumors that 15 Washington players were suffering from stomach poisoning. Coach Backshaw declared 40 lbs. of oxalate beer with the team that several players were slightly indignant following their training table meal Wednesday but that it was nothing serious. He said this would not affect the playing of the team.

Today's game marks the 22nd meeting of the teams on the gridiron since athletic relations were established between the two universities. The Huskies have won 11 games and Oregon 8. Three were tied.

STANFORD WHIPS VANDALS 47 TO 0

Pop Warner's Cardinals Surprise Idaho With Crushing Defeat

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 20 (AP)—Stanford University passed and pounded its way to a 47 to 0 victory over the heavy University of Idaho eleven here yesterday. Idaho's feeble efforts were crushed beneath a Stanford drive that started from the opening kick-off and netted the Cardinals seven touchdowns.

After a scoreless first period Stanford crossed Idaho's goal line for a touchdown in the second; called over two more in the third quarter, and ended with four more in the last fifteen minutes of play. Idaho was beaten from the start. Its reputedly powerful line, outwrestling Stanford by many points proved to be an open network for the Cardinal offensive. Only in the first few minutes after the opening kickoff was Stanford checked. From that time on until the final gun, the Cardinals ripped and dashed through the Northern rivals. Twice in the first period Stanford drove to within scoring distance, only to lose the ball on attempted passes. Idaho was able to gain only 55 yards from scrimmage and made three first downs.

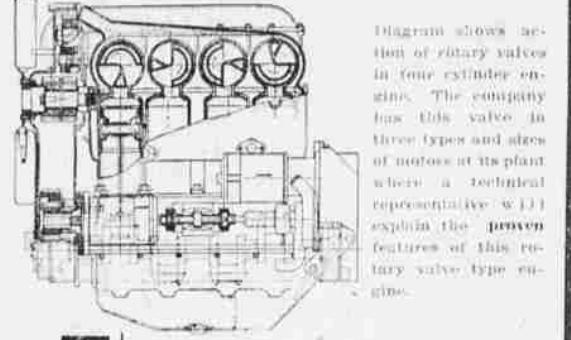
