CHICAGO, Oct. 20 (AP)—A suit by a 16-year-old boy to keep out of school was something new in circuit court records today.
The suit, brought by Russell (Bill) Day, is against the board of education, to restrain it from compelling Day to attend school. It is the youth's contention that the board has no right to interfere with the boy's privilege to earn a living, and that its action is unconstitutional.
Day gets \$167 a month in the employ of an insurance company, and supports his mother, who has no other means of support. The school board had notified the boy's employer that because he is not yet 17 years old he is required, under state law, to spend eight hours a week in continuation school.

Millon-Freewater, twice champion of Eastern Oregon, slipped off many long runs, mostly the result of double cross-cross formations that sent the ball around an unexpected end. Many gains were also made through La Grande's line, the opposing forwards opening holes almost at will, according to reports.
The La Grande team is said to have not played as strong a game as the week before when the Mac-III bunch, smarting from a 10 to 0 defeat in Dayton, Wash., gave the Tigers everything they had.
La Grande's next game will be with Baker in La Grande on Oct. 27.
Summing up the game, Coach R. W. Christie expressed the opinion that the Tigers' field generalship was poor, the tackling was high and the blocking ragged, although he said that for eight minutes in the second half La Grande settled down and played good football. The Tigers' aerial attack did little, with eight passes being grounded, one intercepted for a touchdown and only one completed. Mac-III completed three or four and lost two due to interception.
Two of Mac-III's touchdowns were on spinners through the center of the line, two were made by kicking the end, one on a forward pass and the other on the intercepted La Grande pass.
The field, well-worn turf, was fast but La Grande was on the defense most of the time. At times, however, La Grande made Mac-III but could not do it consistently.

Obituary

WILLIAM BOLLONS
Funeral services for William Bollons, of Portland, who died yesterday, will be held in Portland Sunday. Mr. Bollons was a well-known resident of La Grande for many years when he was detailed superintendent of the O. W. R. & N. railroad. He held the position from July 1, 1914 to April 1, 1928, when he retired.

Mr. Bollons was born June 2, 1852, at Lincoln, England. In 1871 he began his railroad career as a section laborer with the Grand Trunk railroad. In 1871 he worked for the St. Louis Iron Mountain and Southern. 1882 he worked with the Chicago and Alton as an extra gang foreman. In 1887 he was with the Santa Fe lines as roadmaster and in 1899 he accepted the position as roadmaster of the O. W. and Southern Pacific. In 1905 Mr. Bollons became general road master of the O. W. In 1904 he worked with the Southern Pacific lines as road master and in 1905 became division engineer of the Southern Pacific Oregon lines.
