

2 NEW CHRYSLER MODELS EXHIBITED

Convertible - type B body Styles '75' Chassis Announced in Detroit

DETROIT, Oct. 20.—Two new custom convertible type body styles on its "75" chassis are announced by Chrysler as ready for display at many of its automobile showrooms throughout the country. They are the convertible sedan and convertible coupe, the former of five-passenger capacity, the latter with running board, full compartment and other features.

Both bodies are for trucks especially built to Chrysler specifications. The sedan, particularly, contains many innovations and improvements in convertible type construction. At the same time, points out J. W. Frazer, Chrysler sales manager, prices have been brought down to an exceptionally moderate figure. The sedan runs at \$22.40 and the coupe at \$20.25, each at Detroit.

Abandon of these two new body styles broadens out the "75" line to eight body styles to a variety of color combinations, upholstery, body trim and other finish.

Combines Sedan and Phaeton

The convertible sedan combines the luxuriousness and comforts of a smart, distinctive sedan type body with the dash and freedom of a specialty-built phaeton, giving the owner all the advantages of two distinct body styles in one chassis, Mr. Frazer says. All pillars are specially designed, with the front four integral with the body. The top frame is heavily constructed side pieces, firmly secured to the pillars, affording body rigidity and strength comparable to customary "75" sedan body construction. Four pillars, top bars and side rails, fold back and fit into a hand-folded hood, extending out over the back of the body in a streamlined, providing an unusually compact and neat appearing assembly.

Many innovations also are noted in the convertible coupe. Rear pillars and top fold down close to the body, changing it into an open type car of the same beauty, smoothness and style as the "75" roadster. Like the convertible sedan, the glass

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Moscow Boasts Few Private Cars; Speed Makes It Terrifying, However

MOSCOW (AP)—The crowded capital of the reds has fewer automobiles than any large city in Europe, yet it is one of the most terrifying places in the world for pedestrians, of whom there are 2,225,000 in Moscow.

There is little street traffic, but

apparently no laws regulate what little there is. The trains rumble at moderate speed. So, therefore, do the dilapidated and far from immaculate little hacks, bunched up and down the cobblestone hills by

The dashing men who steer the Moscow taxis are, perhaps, the only drivers in Europe who breeze through the streets at a faster clip than the Paris taxicab chauffeurs, whose rest and nonchalance is celebrated. Brown and swathed, the Moscow taxis tear up and down the cobblestones, bouncing and lurching at full tilt, with pedestrians scattering in front of them and taking to the street again in their wake.

Buses do not come along very frequently, but when they do they come quickly and they get you somewhere in a hurry. The fare varies with the distance, five cents for every mile and a half or so. Trains are slightly cheaper and considerably slower.

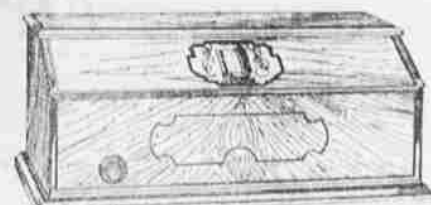
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
