CLUB ATTACKS HOOVER

CHICAGO, Oct. 22 (AP)—The Alfred G. Smith-for-President Union Labor League has issued a statement charging Herbert Hoover, republican presidential nominee with being an advocate of the "open shop."

The statement declares: "Mr. Hoover testified before the senate committee on education and labor, according to the record and files with the New York Times of May 12, 1926, that 'mutual feeling of responsibility between employer and employee must be restored by some system of shop organization. The principle of individual freedom requires the open shop.'"

The union labor league's spokesman is John Fitzgerald, president of the Chicago Federation of Labor.

Roof Markings For Planes Advocated

NEW YORK, October 22 (AP)—A nation-wide movement for the identification of towns and cities by roof markings as an aid to aerial navigation has been announced by Harry P. Guggenheim, president of the Daniel Guggenheim fund for the promotion of aeronautics.

With the cooperation of the post-office department, he said, the fund has enlisted the assistance of 5,000 postmasters throughout the country in communities of a population of about 1,000 or more.

Ukrainian Peasant Revolt Rumored

KISHINEV, Rumania, Oct. 22 (AP)—The rumor of a revolt by Ukrainian peasants against Rumanian authorities is again circulating here. The present version is that armed bands seized municipal buildings in the Ukrainian towns of Zastoki and Orta and troops were sent against them. The soldiers were driven off and according to one rumor "hundreds" were killed or wounded in the engagement.

Woman Drives Her Plane Under Spans

NEW YORK, Oct. 22 (AP)—Miss Eleanor Smith, aviatix who recently set a new altitude record for American women, Sunday flew a plane under the four cast iron bridges in succession.

Leaving from Curtis field in a small biplane, she swooped under the McCormack bridge and then flew under Brooklyn bridge and headed back toward the flying field. Veteran pilots said the feat never had been performed by a woman.

Witnesses To Be Recalled to Stand

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22 (AP)—The federal trade commission announced today that A. K. Smith, controller and assistant secretary of the Electric Bond and Share company of New York, and Ralph P. Frazier, vice president in charge of public relations of that company, who testified in a hearing on utility-financing investigation, will be recalled to the stand tomorrow. Mr. Frazier, secretary of the company, also is expected to testify.

Aberdeen Company Destroyed by Fire

ABERDEEN, Oct. 22 (AP)—Fire here today swept the plant of the Aberdeen Plywood company destroying buildings and stock valued at more than \$200,000. Only the power house, steam boiler and a peeler escaped damage. More than \$60,000 worth of stock in the ware house was destroyed.

Government Will Oust Communists

LONDON, Oct. 22 (AP)—The Daily Sketch said today that the government had decided to dismiss all communists now employed at the Woolwich arsenal and the naval dockyards unless they renounced their allegiance to communist doctrines.

The paper said the decision was due to reports to the government of communist agitation among workers at the Portsmouth, Devonport and Chatham dockyards and to the open revolutionary aims of the communist party.

One workman at Woolwich already has been dismissed after rejecting the proffered alternative.

The policy of the trade unions has been to oppose communist doctrines but not to exclude communists from membership.
