There are 22-121 orphans still in training and 30,000 refugees in the Near East, needing help. Mr. Parsonage stated: "The work of Near East Relief needs its climax. As soon as the 22,121 children still in its care are provided for and remaining refugee plague spots are eliminated, Near East relief will have the satisfaction of having completed the immediate task committed to it by congressional charter," he declared.

Mr. Towler in Portland—E. D. Towler had a two-day mission in Portland when he visited there during the weekend. He attended the meeting of the committee on the relation between secondary schools and institutions of higher learning which was held at the University club. At that time the members of the committee discussed college entrance requirements, uniform admission to college standards and other problems relating to high school and college relationships. All day Friday Mr. Towler visited the University High school to study the system used there. Fourteen hundred students attend the institution he said. The school is known to have a new building. The school is also putting on a winning football team this year.

scientific research of national defense, or in planning a new art, it will at times necessarily produce a new art. But they must be a by-product of the major purpose, not the major purpose itself.

Explains Position—"Nor do I wish to be misinterpreted as believing that the United States is free-fall and devil-take-the-hindmost. The very essence of democracy is opportunity and of American individualism is that there shall be no domination by any group or combination in this republic, whether it be business or political. On the contrary, it demands economic justice as well as political and social justice.

The republican standard bearer explained that he felt deeply in this subject because during the year he had some practical experience with governmental operation and control, adding that he had witnessed not only at home but abroad the many failures of government in business.

"I have seen the government, he declared, the very mechanism which carry our people forward to progress," he said. "I have witnessed the lack of advance, the lowered standards of living, the depressed spirit of people working under such a system."

Confident of Victory—Twice during the strenuous day that preceded his appearance at the garden, the republican candidate gave voice to his firm belief that over-confidence alone could bar a republican victory at the polls. The first came at a press conference, where he departed from his customary procedure and permitted his remarks to be quoted.

Shortly afterward in a talk to national and New York state republican workers, the nominee made his second declaration of confidence, coupled with a reminder that the duty of these leaders was to see that every republican voter reached the polls and that the ballot was honestly counted.

RASKOB COMMENTS—NEW YORK, Oct. 23 (AP)—John J. Raskob, democratic national chairman, commenting today on Herbert Hoover's New York speech, said it was "ridiculous" for Mr. Hoover to attempt to make Governor Smith appear as a man who believes in government in hand.

NORRIS SEES RETALIATION—TACOMA, Wash., Oct. 23 (AP)—Senator George W. Norris of Nebraska, declared here today that Herbert Hoover, in his New York address last night had, by his position on hydro-electric power ripulated all the progressive who have supported him in the past. Senator Norris made this statement in an interview just before he left with Tacoma city officials to inspect the famous Tacoma Chisholm power plant, often characterized as the most successful municipal power development in the country.

Senator Norris, who is visiting Washington in the interests of the reelection of Senator C. C. Dill, democrat, read the Hoover speech this morning at breakfast time, expressing the keenest interest in it.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23 (AP)—Herbert Hoover returned to his headquarters here today from New York where he delivered his last eastern address last night, keenly gratified at its reception by the throng which cheered him tumultuously in Madison Square Garden.

The senator went to work immediately on the ranch, he will deliver on route to California, which probably will be delivered at St. Louis. There was no comment on the fact that all of the members of the Hoover party were highly pleased over the nature of Mr. Hoover's reception by the New York crowd.

PRINCETON, Ore., Oct. 23 (AP)—The first local branch of the University of Oregon "Boards" was organized here last night by about 30 fathers of University students. This is the first local group in the state, and the organizers were enthusiastic over plans made for the future. "Gang No. 2" will be organized at La Grande tonight and No. 3 at Baker tomorrow.

J. R. Raley was named chairman of "The Gang," and he named a committee consisting of Mark Harber, Edwin Winter and J. E. Temple to draw up a constitution and by-laws for the organization.

The date met last night with Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, president of the University of Oregon, and for two hours university work and problems were discussed. Following the discussion, Dr. Bennett pointed out the possibilities of an extensive research program in recreation. Many industries, he said, could profit by such research. He described the progress made in North Carolina where such a program has been carried on under the direction of the state university.

BORAH ENDING HIS CAMPAIGN IN THE SOUTH—JOPLIN, Mo., Oct. 23 (AP)—Senator William B. Borah, of Idaho, will terminate his campaign trip for Herbert Hoover through southern and border states with a speech here tomorrow and then will return to Washington to make in political speaking in the east.

This plan was announced today by the senator, who said that at present he did not know into which eastern and possibly southern states his further campaign activities would carry him. He will reach Washington the morning of Oct. 28.

The senator invaded the sixth state of his present campaign journey on his entry into the political border state of Missouri today. No speaking was scheduled and he planned to take a rest from recent campaign activities.

Coming here from Idaho, where he spoke last night, Mr. Borah planned to make his Joplin speech tomorrow night a defense of Hoover's position on the farm relief issue, to the belief that this is one of the outstanding issues of this section.

Hughes to Speak For Hoover, Curtis—ST. JOSEPH, Mo., Oct. 23 (AP)—Charles McNamara, Hughes arrived here today for his address in Merriamfield at the Canyon hotel in behalf of the Hoover-Curtis ticket.
