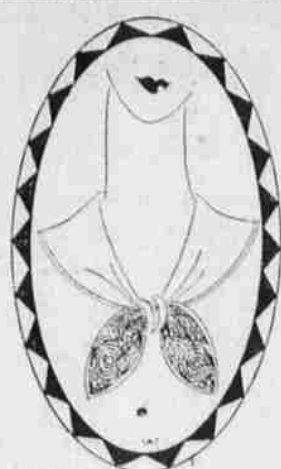
Goes to Eugene—

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graduate school of business administration at high salaries, one of them amounting to \$11,000 a year. Inability of the university to compete with such high salary offers resulted in the loss of these professors, Dr. Hall said.

"Progress and prosperity of Oregon depends upon work done at and under the direction of the state university," said Dr. Hall. "The people of the state also owe it to the young men and women to give them as good training as they can get in the states to the north and south. The institution is facing a real crisis, and aid must be given this year."

When he arose to speak at the close of his speech, Dr. Hall won much popular applause. He was introduced by Ray Williams, chairman of the banquet committee.

Mr. Barker Speaks—
Bert Brown Barker, introduced by Dr. Hall, who described him as a man desiring to devote the remaining years of an active life to the service of his native state in honor of the memory of a very wonderful mother, was enthusiastically greeted. "I am delighted to return to my native state," Mr. Barker remarked. "The scene of my childhood have never gone from me." Mr. Barker when he was 12 years old went to Chicago later going to New York where he became a prominent lawyer and it was after making his fame and fortune that Mr. Barker heeded the "unhallowed and unwholesome" of the westward to help train the state to higher ideals and life.

HOOVER WILL QUIT CAPITAL IN ONE WEEK

seem and will be broadcast over a national radio hookup. The republican nominee passed into the final stage of his campaign for the presidency today. He returned to Washington yesterday from New York and plunged immediately into plans for his trip to his home in California to vote. With the exception of a delegation of social workers on today's engagement list, he contemplated several days of comparative quiet while he grinds out the speech he will make on the trip across the country.

Hoover Confident

Water transportation and flood control have been suggested as possible subjects for his St. Louis address in view of the great interest of that area in both questions. Supreme confidence in the final outcome of the election was reflected in Hoover's mood yesterday when he talked with newspaper correspondents after lunching with President Coolidge. "You seem to be happy," one of the interviewers remarked, noticing the candidate's broad smile. "I have no reason to be otherwise," he responded. Hoover turned to the preparation of his western speech today, expecting to spend most of his remaining time in Washington at this task and in making a general survey of the pre-election situation. He reached Washington early yesterday from New York and went

to his personal headquarters on Massachusetts avenue shortly afterward.

Hoover spent an hour and a half with President Coolidge but declined to reveal the nature of their conversation, when he left.

CURTIS TO QUIT NEW YORK

SEN. ROUTH WITH SENATOR CURTIS TO ROCHESTER, N. Y., Oct. 24 (AP)—A three-day campaign in upper New York state ended tonight for Senator Curtis, the republican vice presidential nominee. From Rochester he will depart tomorrow for a windup drive in the middle western farm areas. Curtis, Albany and Rochester were visited by the senator in Governor Smith's state this week. Early in the campaign he spoke at Syracuse.
