## OREGON TEAM TO INVADE SEATTLE

### Schissler and His Aggies Will Leave Corvallis for Washington Tonight

CORVALLIS, Oct. 25 (AP)—Light workouts with scrimmage periods with the freshman eleven as a closer have been used by Coach Paul J. Schissler of Oregon State college during preparation for the game with University of Washington in Seattle next Saturday. Failure of the Oregon State varsity to meet regularly caused Schissler considerable worry. The backfield forces and the reserve tackle material on the line both present a patched up appearance.

Unless unexpected developments arise the Orange mentor will start the same line-up against Washington that faced Washington State last week. This includes a veteran forward wall in front of a sophomore backfield. The sophomores turned in a commendable performance against the Washington State Cougars but lack the playing experience needed to assure consistent football. The presence of the veteran Howard Mangle at quarter strengthens the ball-toting department materially. The Oregon State eleven planned to leave Corvallis tonight and to arrive in Seattle tomorrow morning. Tomorrow afternoon the Orange mentor will run his proteges through a workout on the Washington gridiron which they have not invaded since 1924.

### HUSKIE "UP IN AIR"

SEATTLE, Oct. 25 (AP)—With their final heavy practice today before tapering off for the Oregon State college game here Saturday, the University of Washington eleven was still up in the air. Coach Elmer Bagshaw, standing his forward wall around until every available man had shown what he could do.

While Bagshaw was worried as to who will play where the Oregon States stood out as slight favorites with gridiron observers to down the Huskies. O. S. C. has lost both of its coast conference games to Washington State and P. S. C. but Washington has shown no decided strength despite its pre-conference victories and the defeat of Montana. Holes in the husky line and the weakness of its backfield were perfectly uncovered in its crushing defeat at the hands of Oregon last week.

## AUSTRALIA SHOWS DEFICIT

MELBOURNE (AP)—Recent heaviness of Australian obligations in the New York market may be explained by the fact that for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1928, every state in the Commonwealth except Queensland reported a deficit. ## Uclas Prepare To Tackle Gem State Eleven

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 25 (AP)—The first of two invasions of the northwest's football stronghold by the football team of the University of California at Los Angeles, playing its first season in the Pacific coast conference, was under way today.

Victims of a conference triumph over the Idaho Vandals at Moscow Saturday colored the otherwise blue and wearisome trail ride of the Bruins to the northwest. The squad, twenty-five strong and accompanied by coach William Spaulding and his assistant A. J. Starnes, departed at 5:30 a. m. for Portland on the Portland and Seattle route.

Spaulding indicated that departures that left the Bruins at Moscow Saturday colored the otherwise blue and wearisome trail ride of the Bruins to the northwest. The squad, twenty-five strong and accompanied by coach William Spaulding and his assistant A. J. Starnes, departed at 5:30 a. m. for Portland on the Portland and Seattle route.

Every member of the regular staff and a few substitutes were nursing injuries they received when the hurricanes struck them at Geor. stadium.

Big Bill Kushnick, Idaho's starting punter, was the most seriously injured. A twisted neck, gotten at the kickoff last Friday, was expected to keep him from the lineup. Paul Hutchinson, the Vandals' sensational ball carrier, had a broken nose but may be able to start Saturday.

## Ruth's Chair Gives Way During Meeting

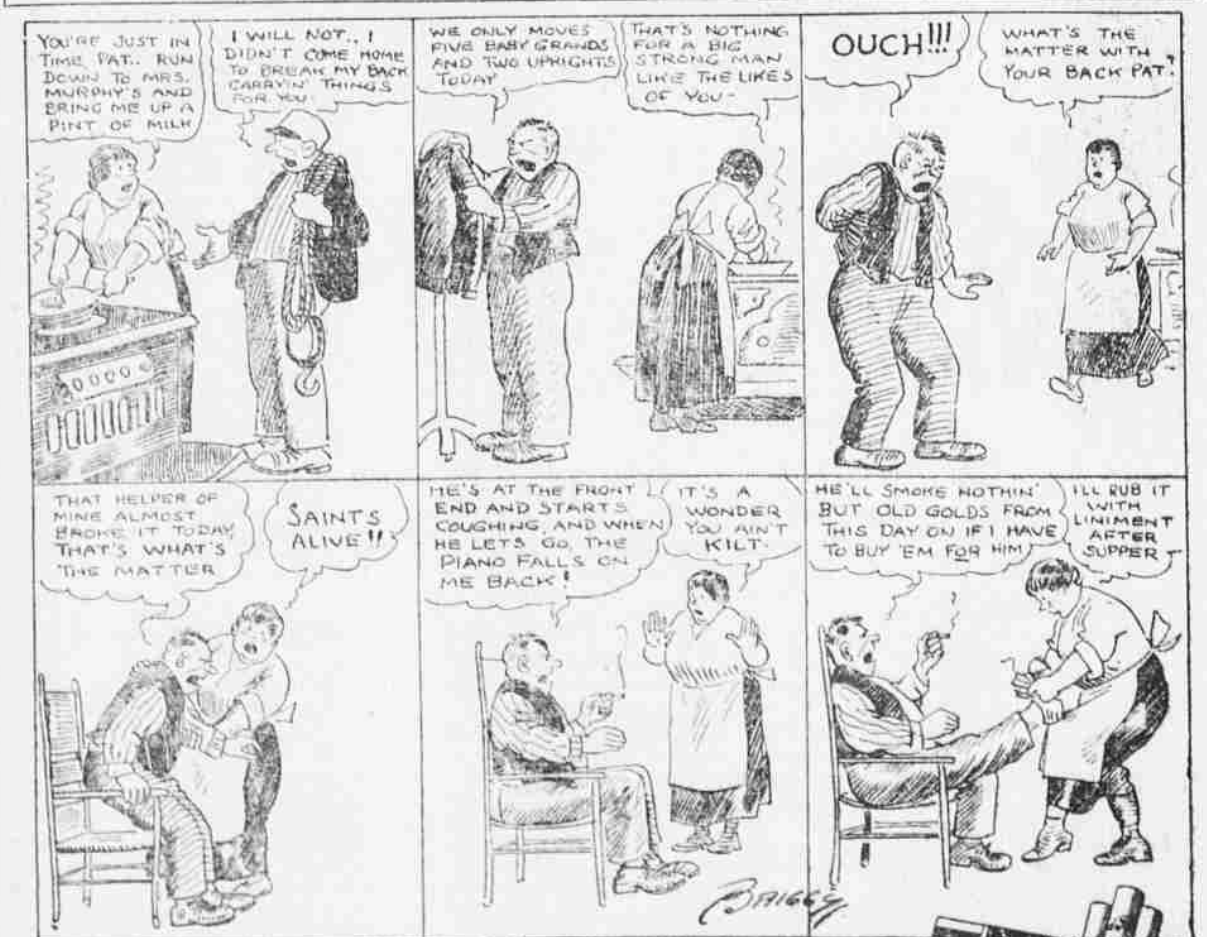
