MENUS

BY MISS MARY
BREAKFAST — Shred potatoes, caramel cream, roast beef in gravy on toast, broiled tomatoes, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON — Cream of cauliflower soup, cream and cheese salad, rolled oats pudding, milk, tea.

DINNER—Broiled veal cutlets, potatoes au gratin, spinach in lemon sauce, cream, sweet, plain cake, milk, coffee.

The luncheon pudding is an excellent dessert for children and sufficiently interesting for grown-ups. Left-over cereal could be used to advantage if at hand.

Rolls Oats Pudding
One-half cup rolled oats, 2 cups milk, 1 cup sugar, 2 eggs, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, 1/2 teaspoon salt.
Heat milk to scalding point and add sugar and salt. Add rolled oats and cook, stirring constantly to prevent sticking for 15 minutes. Remove from fire and add yolks of eggs beaten until thick and lemon colored. Mix well and fold in white of eggs beaten until stiff and dry with a wire whisk. Add vanilla and then into a well-buttered mold. Place in a large pan of hot water and bake 1 1/2 hours in a moderate oven. Remove from mold and serve with cream sauce.

Cream Sauce
One-half cup sugar, 1/2 cup milk, 2 eggs, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, few grains salt.
Beat yolks of eggs with sugar until thick. Heat milk to scalding point and beat into first mixture, beating until thick. Beat whites of eggs until stiff and dry and fold into first mixture with vanilla and salt. Chill and serve.

DO WE NEGLECT OUR CHILDREN?

We hear the statement frequently made that nothing is too good for our children. It is true that we spend millions of dollars for their education. The cost per child in almost a hundred dollars a year. Why do we spend a hundred dollars to spend a few additional dollars to protect their health? Is a question that every parent should give serious consideration.

It has been clearly demonstrated that there is an immense amount of preventable disease and death among our children. We would be all happier if we could prevent this unnecessary death. It is in the first year, in the first month, and in the first ten years of life that the greatest losses occur. We are undoubtedly paying more and paying foolishly in our bodies of neglecting the lives of our children.

The child should be considered as an investment asset. It has cost money to bring him into the world and when he reaches maturity he will produce more than he cost to bring him up. The worth of this date is increasing because almost every child has the capacity to produce more than the average. It costs nearly \$10,000

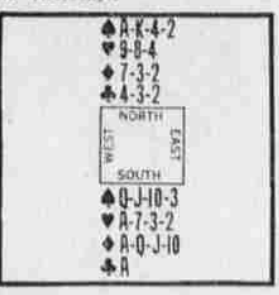

Bridge Pointers

Today's hand is part of a series of fifty Auction Bridge questions running on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays.



South declares, contract No. 70 Trump, to either bid. To the first trick West leads the Five of Hearts, and East plays the Jack.

Question No. 43. Should South win this trick or duck?

Question No. 44. When South does obtain the lead, regardless of whether it be the first trick or later, he would lead the Queen of Spades and play the Deuce from Dummy; which card should be led from South and which card should be played from Dummy to the succeeding trick?

Answer Blank

43. (Fill in the blank with your play before you read the answer that follows.)

44. South should win the first trick.

Holding up to keep the lead from West would be futile because, in the play, South will lose Diamonds and if the finesse loses West will obtain the lead.

Furthermore, with Seven of Hearts in his two hands and with only four Hearts in the long adverse hand, Declarer is not as much afraid of the adverse Hearts as he is of the adverse Clubs—a suit in which he has only four. If he duck the first trick, the adversaries may shift that lead to Clubs.

44. South is sure of one Heart, one Club and four Spades. Three Diamonds will give him game, but he wants four if he can get them. His best chance for making every Diamond trick is by finessing, and he may want to finess three times. If the adverse Spade division is the probable 3-2, he can get three Spade entries in Dummy by over-taking an honor twice. Should the adverse Spade division be 4-1, it will be shown on the second Spade trick; and in that case he will not overtake again, but will win the last two Spades with the Ten and Ace respectively.
