Making Attempt To Stop Buying Moslem Brides

SAMARKAND, Turkistan (AP)—A merciless struggle against polygamy and the paying of "Kulim," or ransom for modern brides, has been started by higher government authorities throughout the Kazak, Uzbek and Tadzhik republics in Central Asia. A special society to fight these Mohammedan practices has been organized.

Ten years of intensive Bolshevik propaganda have affected the practices of Moslem rites by the native population, but little was known certain classes of government officials and communists, who in the depth of their souls still cling to the law of the prophet.

The Sar-Dorinsk communist party organization, submitted a report stating that Kulim and polygamy, although conceded in form, were evaded by the natives through the use of money, but even among communists, old and young, another practice adverse to communist doctrine in the trading of marriageable girls by their parents to the highest bidder, and the subsequent resale of the girls if the bid is later raised by some other person. An example was the case of a certain Dzhambay, once a wealthy Kirghiz peasant of the Barabinsk Steppes. He submitted before the Moscow court this letter:

"In 1920 I was married in accordance with our Moslem customs and ancient traditions, to Machi Tembekova, and paid for her seven cows, five oxen and ten sheep. Two months later my wife deserted me and joined her father, who sold her soon afterwards to a second husband for 225 roubles each. I was ruined and all my appeals to local authorities to get my wife or property back, were in vain. Today I have become a poor farmhand, while my runaway wife, I have learned, has been recently resold by her father to a third husband."

NEW HIGHWAY SHOPS NEAR COMPLETION

(Continued from Page 1)

Two ten-thousand gallon storage tanks for fuel oil to supply the heating unit. The buildings will be steam heated throughout from the central heating plant.

The shop building, material storage building and storage sheds are all of standard mill type of construction which means they are built of lumber and properly treated. All the mill type of buildings are painted white with metal roofs.

The grounds surrounding the building are fenced in with a seven foot industrial type of fence with three strands of barbed wire on top.

The railroad spur which was built last spring from the main line to the highway office location, will be used for shipping and receiving equipment.

Next year, it is planned to build a new maintenance patrol building for the purpose of storing and handling equipment of the local patrolmen such as snow removal plows in the winter and graders in the summer.

In the spring sidewalks will be constructed the entire length of the building facing on Adams and for 150 feet on Willow. A lawn with flowers and shrubs will also be planted and the yard landscaped.

Stevenson, district bridge engineer; Mr. Moore, clerk and assistant to Mr. Stevenson; H. D. Smith, general shop superintendent; and Mr. Whitted, general shop foreman.
