Bridge Pointers

CONTRACT BRIDGE
 Continuing our series of No Trump hands in Contract Bridge, in which slam bidding is considered, we give today one with a novel and interesting feature.



The Bidding

South has a veritable whale; he has a big count in every suit with a total of 25. With such a holding a slam is probable, but if South should bid three No Trumps, he would practically assured by his own cards, there would be little chance of any other bid being made. South wants to try for a slam if North has the Ace of Clubs and he can find out about that by bidding four No Trumps. Any bid of more than three shows slam probabilities and commands the partner to show an Ace if he have one.

There is some question as to what should be the minimum count for a bid of four No Trumps. All concede that the bid should not be made unless every suit is safely stopped twice and the hand counts a minimum of 25, but there are some who think 25 too dangerous and 27 the proper figure. South's hand fulfills the most rigid requirement.

North would pass if South had bid three No Trumps, but the bid of one more than game commands him to show his Ace, so he bids five Clubs.

After North's Ace-showing bid, South is sure of four Clubs, three Spades, two Hearts and one Diamond, leaving only three possible losers. North is not to fill in one or two of these vacancies, and an extra trick is assured if a Heart or Diamond is the original lead. In view of all this, South feels safe in bidding six No Trumps and has hopes of scoring an over-trick as well.

Examining two hands it will be noted that if West had a Spade or a Club, South will get two discards on North's long Spades and will have the even chance of finesse for a Grand Slam, and if West opens with a Heart or a Diamond, it will be a show-down for a Grand Slam; but with a Small Slam practically assured, bidding a Grand Slam and raking a set would be unsound.
