Pendleton, Ore., Oct. 26, 1928

To the Editor:

The unfair and dishonest methods used by the enemies of Judge Rand in their effort to defeat him for the office of justice of the supreme court have been extended to the extravagant claims they are making for his opponent in the race, Lloyd Graham.

Graham's supporters, including the Portland Telegram, are telling him as the "father" of the Oregon road program and the author of the gasoline tax law.

The following facts are taken from the house and senate journals of the 1917 and 1919 sessions of the Oregon legislature:

The present road program was initiated at the 1917 session, when house bill 559 was introduced by William Schenck, chairman of the roads and highways committee of the house, and 30 other members, including the undersigned. This bill provided for the initial \$3,000,000 bond issue along with the plan to retire the bonds with funds from increased automobile license fees. It also laid out the present road map. At the same session the Bean-Barrett bill, providing funds for co-operation with the federal government under the Shafterford act, was passed.

Louis E. Bean, present commissioner of public utilities and a member of the house in 1917, first introduced the gas tax bill. It was known as house bill 186 and provided a one-cent tax on gasoline and one-half cent on distillate. This bill was referred to the committee on assessment and taxation and was returned to the house with an unfavorable report and was indefinitely postponed. As Lloyd Graham was not a member of the legislature in 1917, it would require a considerable stretch of the imagination to vision him as the "father" of any legislation passed at that session.

At the 1919 session house bill 424, introduced by the joint senate and house road and highway committee, was passed. I well remember L. E. Bean, author of the gasoline tax bill at the 1917 session, appearing before the committee and urging the passage of this gas tax bill, which was almost a copy of his bill, W. H. Dennis of Carlton was chairman.

of the 1919 house road and highway committee, and not Mr. Graham, as claimed by his boosters in the voters' pamphlet.

However, Mr. Graham at the last session was "father" of the Wilson river road bill, which would have provided the placing of a new road on the highway map through Washington county (where he lives) to Tillamook. On the original highway map there were two perfectly good roads laid out to Tillamook, one by way of McMinnville and one by way of Astoria. These roads have both been completed. There are many miles of roads placed on the original highway map in Eastern Oregon, planned to serve inaccessible parts of the state, which are still not built. The Roosevelt highway is yet uncompleted. Yet Mr. Graham, in order to gratify the selfish interests of his own county, already well supplied with roads, would break the tacit understanding that no new roads be placed upon the highway map until the original program was completed. Governor Patterson wisely vetoed this bill.

No one questions Lloyd Graham's honesty, but his many friends deplore his lack of judgment in allowing George Joseph and other political gangsters to persuade him to commit political suicide by becoming their cat's paw.
