Blondes In Fashion, Say Hairdressers

PARIS (AP)—Dressmakers take no responsibility for the fashion for blond hair that is sweeping Paris, but hairdressers attribute the fact that their customers are "going blond" to the delicate colors for evening dictated by winter fashion.

As blonds and medium auburns are a vogue of this winter, mannequins with pale blond hair are in growing demand at dress houses to display evening frocks of delicate shades of pink, blue, jade green and straw colors. White and black also are effective on the blond mannequins and nearly every house is taking on light haired girls and washing out the brunettes.

An American, shopping at a house with a notable collection of blond mannequins, remarked said: "You might as well be dead if you're not blond."

Another development of hair styles is curls. They are worn by blonds and brunets alike, but the golden haired girls seem more addicted to curls at the back of the neck than their darker sisters.

At one famous hairdressing shop artists of the comb and dye brush report general use of henna and bleaching preparations to tone brown hair to auburn shades. Auburn hair is considered especially smart with the wine red costumes of the season.

Bridge Pointers

Continuing the consideration of Minor take-outs of partner's No Trump is the inexperienced player should fix in his mind the following general principles:

When there is no score, two of a Minor is not bid over partner's one No Trump to show strength, but as a warning or "rescue." At a low score, the overcalling of partner's No Trump with two Clubs or two Diamonds tells the No Trump player "I have no help for you; unless you are unusually strong, we had better play with this Minor (the trump as we shall lose)." A sound No Trump player whose partner at a low score, has overcalled with two of a Minor, never rebids his No Trump unless he has at least eight more tricks in his own hand. The Minor take-out is a simultaneous warning of the white flag of surrender, the red flag of scrapping, and the blue flag of desperation. It announces a holding whose only bright aspects is the fact that there are at least five cards in the suit that is bid.

Although the warning conveyed by the Minor take-out is unmistakable, it is not the best policy always to take out with a five-card Minor and a worthless hand. Such a bid may give too much information and encouragement to the opponents and, with a hand as evenly divided as one that contains a five-card suit can be (i.e., the 5-3-3-2 division), it is generally better to pass the partner's No Trump no matter how weak the Minor suit and the rest of the hand may be. But the rescue is apt to be advisable when, with a worthless five-card Minor, the division is either:

POMONA, Cal., Oct. 28 (AP)—A cross fire of criticism was turned today upon "schoolies" and police for rowdiness between students of an Orange and a Pomona high school here, late Friday, resulting in the death of one youth.

Two Diamonds should be bid with No. 3, because of the singleton and because a weak two-suit is almost worthless as No Trump support; and two Clubs with No. 4, because there are six cards in the worthless Minor and no strength in the remainder of the hand.

MENUS

BREAKFAST — Wheat cereal cooked with dates, cream, apple sauce, crisp fried bacon, oven toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON — Cream of onion soup, croissants, elder salad, chocolate rice pudding, milk, tea.

DINNER — Spanish steak, mashed potatoes, stuffed pear salad, bran rolls, peach shortcake, milk, coffee.

Either round or sirloin steak can be used for the "Spanish steak" suggested in the dinner menu. Round steak is the cheaper since there is less waste in bone. Sirloin is tenderer, finer grained and juicier than round, but since this particular dish must have long cooking and is combined with tomatoes round steak is very good and if economy must be considered, it should be chosen.

Spanish Steak
One slice round steak cut 1 1/2 inches thick; 2 medium-sized onions, 4 cups canned or chopped fresh tomatoes, 1 cup grated cheese, 2 teaspoons salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper.

Wipe meat with a damp cloth and sear quickly in a hot, slightly greased frying pan. Sear first on one side and then on the other. Put into a casserole with a very little water. Cover with onions sliced very thin. Cover casserole and bake forty minutes in a hot oven. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and pour over tomatoes rubbed through a sieve. Bake forty minutes longer with cover removed. Remove to hot platter, cover with grated cheese and return to oven long enough to melt cheese. If a shallow casserole is used the cheese can be sprinkled over meat in this and the dish served from casserole.
