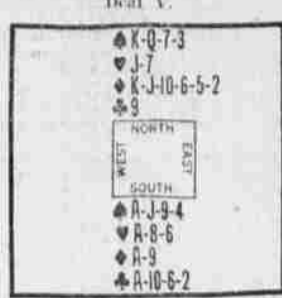
Norwood left last Tuesday morning for California where he will live with his uncle.

## MENUS

By Sister Mary

**BREAKFAST**—Orange juice, cereal, cream, scrambled eggs, crisp white wheat toast, milk, coffee.

**LUNCHEON**—Scalloped rice and mushrooms, herbs of lettuce with French dressing, green peas, grape casserole, milk, tea.

**DINNER**—Hot-pot of hedge-podge, cabbage and pumpkin salad, chocolate cream cake, milk, coffee.

Several kinds of vegetables are included in the "hot-pot of hedge-podge" which is really a carefully made mince stew.

The grape casserole is a delicious to serve with roast fowl or with pop-overs.

**Grape Casserole**—Five pounds (washed) grapes, 5 pounds sugar, 1 pound seedless raisins, 2 oranges, 1 cup nut meats, 1 heaping tablespoon of English walnuts are the best nuts to use. Almonds can be used but they must be blanched and shredded.

Wash grapes and pick from stems. Put and cook pulp and skins separately. Put pulp through colander and remove seeds. Put skins, sifted pulp, graded rind and juice of oranges and raisins into preserving kettle. Bring to the boiling point and slowly stir in sugars. Cook 20 minutes and add nuts. Cook 10 minutes longer and put into sterilized glasses. Cover with paraffin when cold.

Plain grape marmalade is very good and is made the same way, omitting the raisins, oranges and nuts. (Copyright, 1928, NEA Service, Inc.)

## Score: Invaluable, South Declares, Contract No Trump

The play to the first trick led West leads seven of clubs. North plays nine of clubs. East plays King of clubs. South (Closed Hand) wins the trick with the Ace of clubs.

Questions No. 45. What cards should Declarer play from Closed Hand and Dummy to trick 27?

Question No. 46. What cards should Declarer play from Closed Hand and Dummy to trick 35?

**The Answers**

45. Declarer should lead a small Spade from Closed Hand and win the trick in Trummy to place the lead there.

46. Dummy should lead a small Diamond, and unless the Queen be played by East, Closed Hand should play the Nine.

West must have three Clubs higher than the Seven, the fourth best he led originally, consequently by the cards of the first trick marked him with the Q-10. If West should obtain the lead and continue his Clubs, Closed Hand's Ten would stop the suit; but if East should obtain the lead and return his partner's Club, West's Clubs all will be good and the advantage probably will save the game. The Declarer, with a total of eight Diamonds (the Queen missing), should finesse, and should do it by leading toward the South hand so that if the rixness is lost, West—not East—will be in the lead.
